DESERT ISLAND COMEDY PLAYED ON PROCTOR'S STAGE.

SUES HIS CO-EXECUTORS. Alleges That They Have Already Wasted \$175,000 of Porterfield Estate.

Henry Blanchford of the Royal Fire Insurance Company has begun a suit in the Supreme Court in Brooklyn for the appointment of a receiver for the estate of the late Robert Porterfield, valued at about \$200,000, of which he was one of the executors.

The plaintiff alleges that although the testator has been dead for nearly four years no inventory of the estate has ever been filed, that the debts of the estate remain unpaid, that a legacy to Greenwood Cemetery has not been paid and that his fellow executors have dissipated and wasted the funds and neglected and refused to make an accounting.
