

GOSSIP OF THE RUNNERS.

BROOKLYN HANDICAP TO BE RUN ON THURSDAY.

W. C. Whitney's Guide and Goldsmith will probably be the favorites in a Big Field-Close Stake Event at Morris Park in the Belmont.

The racing event of the week is the running of the \$10,000 Brooklyn Handicap on Thursday. Not in recent years has so much interest been manifested in this big race, which will probably attract a large field of runners.

W. C. Whitney has two candidates, Gunfire, the winner of the Metropolitan Handicap, and the four-year-old Goldsmith, who is said to have developed into a sterling race-horse after a year's rest.

It is said that Trainer Rogers believes that Goldsmith, if he stands up, can win the Brooklyn Handicap. The other favorite is Goldsmith, who is in the Brooklyn with 111 pounds, while the latter's impost is 110.

E. R. Thomas, who ran second to Meltonian on Friday, and the three-year-old Yardman, who has shown high-class quality so far this season, are the other two horses in the field.

The Morris Park race, which closes on Wednesday, is a record-breaking event, as more money has been taken by the Westchester Racing Association than at any previous spring meeting.

The rich Belmont stake for three-year-olds and three fillies over the hill, will be run at the close of the season. To-day the feature will be the Van Dyke Handicap, a mile and a half race, which was won by the late Van Dyke.

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SHAMROCK I. TO RACE HERE.

Lipton Plans to Have Her Compete With Malone, Columbia and Constitution.

According to a cable message from the other side, Sir Thomas Lipton is not only going to race the Shamrock I. when she arrives in these waters as a trial boat for the challenger, but will enter that yacht in all the races he can compete with the Reliance, Constitution and Columbia.

The change in the temperature had a depressing effect on the Shamrock I. Only a few hundred shivers in the chilly atmosphere and walked back and forth briskly while watching the spirited contest.

Prominent in the crowd was the old-time champion, John P. Cockerill, 2015. Nathan Straus's son sat behind him, and at times the young reindeer sent the former king of pacers down the stretch at a clip that reminded the crowd of days when "Bobby" swept the Grand Circuit.

The keenest contests of the morning took place between the two trotters Swift 2164, driven by John F. Cockerill, and Malacca 2175, driven by Nathan Straus.

The third heat was a close contest from start to finish. The first two heats were won by Malacca, but in the third heat Swift won by a narrow margin.

The first brush of the morning was short, sharp and decisive. The contestants were Thomas Leamy, behind the black trotter Princess Pique, and the white trotter Trotter Trotter.

The second brush was one of the best ever seen in the city. The contestants were the pacer King Tom 2165, driven by Christopher Hockett, and the trotter Charles W. Hackett.
