Call to Jews to Heed the Lesson It Teaches. PITTSBURGH, June 7.—The Federation of American Zionists, which is holding a convention here, had a big meeting in the Bijou Theatre to-night, and resolutions were adopted declaring that the masses of Kishineff had been wronged and that the continued settlement of Jews in Russia was attended with personal danger and futile martyrdom, and closing: "Therefore, this convention, reaffirming the Zionist principles, calls upon every Jewish congregation and community throughout the United States and upon every individual Jew to give heed to the common interests of humanity and the particular necessity of the Jewish people to help end their present plight by affording the Zionist movement that cordial and financial support, which will enable it to achieve the purpose for which it is organized, the settlement of the Jewish people in Palestine."

Prof. Richard Gorbell of New York made the chief address. He said: "Our gathering this year has an added import because of the events in far-off Russia which have cast their shadow over us. We did not need the Kishineff massacre to show us the way, we did not need the blood of hundreds of innocent victims to point out the road we ought to take. "Who is the physician that, knowing the insidious ravages which disease makes, could not lend all his efforts, not only to stop the ravages of a disease, but to try to prevent its recurrence in the future? We Jews, who are the physicians of the world, we have for our own body politic, what are we doing to prevent the recurrence of Roumanian excesses and Russian massacres? Once more we stand up, saying to our brethren that they be not cajoled by false promises and delusive phantoms. We shall in some way be forced to leave Bessarabia in the near future. But are we mindful of the lot of those who will be left behind?"
