

### APPEAL TO JEWS TO UNITE.

Alleged Discrimination Against Them in Syracuse University and Schools.

SYRACUSE, June 21.—The Rev. Dr. Henry S. Morais, one of the leading rabbis of this city, has come out with a public appeal to his people to band together to put down the alleged prejudice and wholesale discrimination which he says exists against Jewish students in Syracuse University, and in the common and high schools and public institutions of the city.

Religious and sectarian distinctions are glaringly apparent in Syracuse schools, says Dr. Morais, "and in that which even bears comprehensive terms as university. From my positive knowledge students of the Jewish faith are compelled to attend at least college, if not schools, on the Sabbath and on festival and holy days sacred to them. Otherwise they lose marks and are refused a hearing or examination on another time."

### WOMAN DOCTOR SUES.

Brings a Slander Suit for \$5,000 Against a New Brunswick Woman.

New BRUNSWICK, N. J., June 21.—For two weeks Dr. Caroline H. Marsh and her cousin, former Justice C. T. Cowan, have been trying to get at the origin of stories that have been in circulation here that Dr. Marsh is not a graduated physician, and that she has been engaged in criminal practice. As a result one suit for \$500 for slander has been instituted against Mrs. Clarence Oakley of Highland Park, a suburb of this city, and two more suits are about to be begun.

There will be a christening of Italian and American flags in Brommer's Union Park, 133d street and Union avenue, next week, when the First Regiment Nizza Cavalry Society will have its festival and picnic. Port Warden James E. Marsh is honorary president of the regiment, which is composed of officers and men who served in the cavalry in the Province of Nizza, Italy, and he has presided to it a stand of colors. Preceding the festival and picnic there will be a parade from Union Hall, in Prince street.

Benjamin Factor, 18 years old, of 47 Eldridge street, Manhattan, fell from a Hamburg avenue car at Rockaway and Pitkin avenue, East New York, yesterday afternoon, and both legs were badly crushed by the wheels. He was taken to the Bradford Street Hospital. Benjamin Klein, the motorman, was arrested on an accusation of criminal carelessness.
