

GOLF EXPERTS WARMING UP.

AUCHTERLONIE, THE CHAMPION, DOES A 73 AT BALTIUSROL.

George Low Improving in Health—Pairings Announced by the U. S. G. A.—Travis With Aleck Smith, and Douglas With Will Smith—A Good List.

Preliminary skirmishing in the battle royal of the links, the open championship of Friday and Saturday, began yesterday at the Baltiusrrol Golf Club. In most cases the arrivals, the advance guard of the entrants, were content to study the course in the fourness of the desultory order, so as to have its soft and hard spots well in mind before the opening drives of Friday morning.

The Baltiusrrol professional is expected to be out today, and it is probable now that he will be a starter.
