

THE MACEDONIAN GARIBADI.

IVAN TZONTCHEFF IS LOVED BY THE BULGARIAN SOLDIERS.

His Army is Unpaid and He and His Officers Equip Themselves and Often Provide Food for Their Men—Knows How to Combine Separate Bands Effectively.

Gen. Ivan Tzontcheff, who comes to London in a day or two, is in many respects a remarkable man. He is an officer who won the love of the private soldiers of the Bulgarian army as no other man of his day and generation has ever done.

I speak the thing I know, for I have ridden with him to lonely frontier posts when he was supposed to be outside the pale of the protection of the Bulgarian Government and the Bulgarian troops, and wherever the troops have caught sight of him, his welcome has been a triumph.

When I rode with him he wore the plain dress of a "comital" fighting man, and was surrounded by a band of musicians, who had named the bands. But the Bulgarian army had seen him often at their head dressed in all his bared as a leader and a General, and they cared little in what guise he came to them.

He was Little Tzontcheff, the fire eater, the door of deeds—Little Tzontcheff, whom they had seen reel out of the saddle smitten through the chest with a bullet in the ball, and then, when they had seen even from another bitter field maimed in indescribable fashion, Little Tzontcheff, whose eyes had blazed along the lines upon the march, and who had been known to go backward on any field of war.

They had fought with him against the Turk against the Servians, they had fought with him again the day he lifts his little finger, for he has the personal magnetism which causes troops to follow him, and he has the blood of a warrior, to great actions.

The Bulgarian soldiers love him, for they say he is in an action, and for Tzontcheff is in the spot where the danger is greatest, where men are most likely to be killed. Death, his hands upon his cheeks, he is ready, there is the place to look for Tzontcheff, and he is there.

But he is no mere swordsman, no mere leader of the charge. When he stands upon his feet, he has a keen eye upon his men, and he has the wisest of all eyes upon the danger that is about him.
