ROWDY MUST NOT BARK.

At Least, in Populous Harlem—May Yelp in the Country.

Henry P. Cops, a dealer in sporting goods, who lives at 409 West 150th street, was found guilty of maintaining a nuisance, in the Court of Special Sessions yesterday, because Rowdy, his skye terrier, barks.

Proceedings against Cops were instituted by Harlan A. Pierce, who lives at 705 St. Nicholas avenue. Neighbors of Cops and Pierce filled the courtroom because the dispute over the dog has stirred up the occupants of more than one Harlem apartment house. After Mr. and Mrs. Pierce had testified to the annoyance caused by the dog, Policeman John J. Malloy of the Health Squad was called. He agreed with the Pierces that Rowdy had a sharp, rasping bark of remarkable volume for so small a dog.

Six or seven of Cops's neighbors were called to testify that they had never heard Rowdy bark. This irritated Justice Hinsdale, who remarked: "Why not call me as a witness? I, too, have never heard the dog bark."

The Justice then found Cops guilty. Sentence was suspended, however, on his promise to compel Rowdy to keep quiet at night or send him to the country.

PASTOR DENHAM'S DEFENCE

That He Was Away When Offensive Acts Were Committed, as Alleged.

The Rev. Benjamin O. Denham, pastor of the First Church of the Disciples of Christ at 323 West Fifty-sixth street, who has been charged by neighbors with improper acts at the windows of his apartment in 203 West Eighty-first street, had a hearing before Magistrate Mayo yesterday in the West Side police court. The minister is not under arrest. Assistant District Attorney Paul Krotel examined the witnesses brought forward by Mr. Denham to prove that he was not at home at the hour on Jan. 18 when the last alleged offensive act is said to have been committed.

Last Thursday Mrs. Mabel Springhorn of 442 Amsterdam avenue and Mrs. Schroeder of 201 West Eighty-first street, whose back yards abut on the minister's flat, testified that Mr. Denham had annoyed them on various occasions since Sept. 9 of last year by tapping on his window while they were in their back yards to call attention to acts of his as he stood back of his window. The testimony was of such a character that the Magistrate heard

it in private so as not to offend a large number of women who were present. Denham's flock who were in court, about twenty-five women were interested spectators at yesterday's hearing, which was held in open court. The charges were not gone into.

Mrs. Francis Applegate of 405 West 181st street, who testified as to the time Mr. Denham left his study at the church for his home on the afternoon of Jan. 18, testified in court, while Assistant District Attorney Krotel was cross-examining her. She said she had been making Sunday school calls in the neighborhood and stopped at the church for an umbrella.

The hearing was adjourned until Friday afternoon, when further testimony will be heard.

FRAGNER CASE GOES ON.

Lawyer's Marriage Doesn't Keep Matter From Grand Jury.

Assistant District Attorney Elder yesterday directed the attention of the Kings county Grand Jury to the case of Lawyer Albert M. Fragner, who has been accused of obtaining by trick and device \$20,000 in railroad bonds from Camille and Edith Kainer, daughters of the late Otto Kainer. Fragner, who had an office in the same building as that occupied by Magistrate James G. Tighe, was arrested last week and admitted to bail. Since then he has married Mrs. Dorothy Alexander, an elder sister of his two former clients. District Attorney Clarke has been appealed to by friends of Fragner, but he refused to interfere.
