## MRS. POWELL HELD FOR MURDER

ARRESTED FOR KILLING HER SERVANT OF SEVEN YEARS.

Wife of a Delaware Farmer Charged With a Brutal Crime—Boy of Five in the House Says The Woman Was Beaten With a Club—Body Found in the Attic.

DOVER, Del., Feb. 14.—Mrs. Mary Anne Powell, wife of Alfred L. Powell, a farmer of near Bowers Beach, was arrested by State Detectives Ratledge and Francis and placed in Dover jail to-night charged with the murder of Estella Albin, 21 years old. The arrest occurred after the Powells had returned from the funeral of the girl, who had lived with them for seven years. Mrs. Powell maintained the same spirit of indifference she has manifested since the murder was discovered on last Tuesday and did not seem surprised at the arrest. As she left her home she said to a farm hand: "Good by, Peter. I may come back and I may not. I hope they will find out who did this deed and not lay it on me."

Mrs. Powell was accompanied to Dover by Detective Ratledge, who returned to the farmhouse. Powell and the three farmhands are still under surveillance, but it is not known that any more arrests will occur. Considerable significance is attached to the statements made to-day by Edgar Cooper, the five-year-old adopted son of the Powells.


He said that "Aunt Molly" (Mrs. Powell) hit Estella on the head with a piece of wood while she was at work in the outhouse. Estella then ran into the kitchen, where Mrs. Powell again struck her. He did not know what happened then, nor how the girl got to the garret, where her hacked body was found, nor could he tell of the struggle in the little room, before the girl, weakened by loss of blood, fell before her assailant. The room and the stairway leading to it tell of the struggle which must have occurred. Mrs. Powell and the boy were the only occupants of the house after the girl disappeared. When the farm hands asked for the girl at noon, Mrs. Powell said she couldn't find her and supposed she had gone to a neighbor's.

When Mr. Powell returned late in the afternoon, and also asked for the girl, his wife repeated her story. He began a search which led to the discovery of the body. Funeral services were held to-day at Barrett's Chapel, the oldest Methodist Church in this region, and hundreds of people viewed the remains.

Mrs. Powell was indifferent to the scenes, but Mr. Powell wept.
