## A BRIAR PIPE MAY PART THEM

LOVE OF A WEDDED PAIR FLIES IN CLOUDS OF SMOKE.

It Parted Mr. and Mrs. Wilkinson Once Before and Now, Since He Prefers His Pipe to His Wife, She Sues for Divorce Because Tobacco Fumes Make Her Ill.

PATERSON, N. J., April 3.—Mrs. Mary Wilkinson of 99 Burhans lane, this city, has begun suit for divorce from John Wilkinson on the ground that he smokes a pipe. Mrs. Wilkinson in her bill of complaint says that a hereditary trait makes tobacco smoke obnoxious to her; that all her will power cannot shake off the illness that follows the inhalations of tobacco smoke indoors. She says her mother was affected in the same way.

The Wilkinsons came to this city eight years ago from Sayre, Pa. They had been lovers for years and a date was set for their marriage. While selecting rooms for a future home Mr. Wilkinson lighted a cigar. His bride-to-be remonstrated, saying that cigar smoke gave her a headache. She asked her lover to discard the weed. Supposing that this was only a whim he refused her request. A quarrel arose and they parted.

Wilkinson came to this city and obtained employment in a silk mill. Eventually he married. Two years afterward his wife died. He returned to his native home and found that his former sweetheart had followed his example. Shortly after he had gone away from Sayre she married, but was made a widow in eighteen months.

Again they became engaged. Knowing his wife's former aversion to smoking he gave up the habit, and they were married and came to Paterson, where Wilkinson got employment as a silk finisher. Worked failed and he returned to the pipe for solace. But when he did so he found that his wife's hereditary dislike to tobacco smoke had not been obliterated by marriage, and domestic peace flew out of the windows on the clouds of smoke made by his briar wood pipe.

Mr. Wilkinson says his wife does not really hate smoking, but that she is so saving that she grudges him the money for tobacco.
