THE SEMINARY FOR HIGHER CRITICS. PROF. BRIGGS DEFINES A NEW DEPARTURE AT UNION.

The Seminary's Purpose in Establishing a Graduate School, of Which He is the First Professor, is to Carry Students to Higher Fields—His Inaugural Address.

In the presence of a company which filled Adams Chapel of Union Theological Seminary, yesterday afternoon, the Rev. Dr. Charles A. Briggs made his inaugural address as professor of the new graduate chair of theological encyclopaedia and symbolism.

Prof. Briggs' address was a plea for the higher study of theology. He defined theology as the study of God and of all things in their relation with God, and held that there is a marked distinction between theology and dogma...

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
