CANAL CONTRACTS MAY BE EXPECTED ABOUT AUG. 1.

He Will See Horace Porter in Paris, but Won't Tell What About—Will Not Fill City Court Vacancy Until His Return—Sails on the Big Kaber To-day.

Governor-Chairman Odell arrived at the Fifth Avenue Hotel last night. He will leave the hotel at 8 o'clock this morning and take the Statu tug Governor Flower to Hoboken, where he will board the steamer...

There have been reports that the Governor-Chairman would like to have Gen. Porter, the American Ambassador to France, for his candidate for Governor. Asked last night if he had any objection to Gen. Porter, the Governor-Chairman said: "I will not talk about politics or candidates until I get back from abroad."

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CANNOT FIND DR. R. C. FLOWER

TRIAL FOR FRAUDS IN MINING STOCK SET FOR TO-DAY.

His Own Lawyers and Asst. District Attorney Garvan Have Lost All Trace of Him—Mrs. Stone Is on His Bonds for \$25,000 and May Lose Entire Amount.

Dr. R. C. Flower, under five indictments for grand larceny in connection with the sale of worthless mining stock, accused in more than 100 like complaints in Assistant District Attorney Garvan's safe, is missing and will not appear to-day for trial before Recorder Goff in the General Sessions.

Early in this month the trial of Flower was set peremptorily by the Recorder for to-day. The complainants in the five indictments against him are Herbert A. Buttrick, Alden Soliman, H. C. Woodruff, S. Treadwell Woolley and Mrs. Belle Gray Taylor.

The proceedings in the Flower case have cost the county many thousands of dollars for commissions which have been paid for the trial of Arizona, Montana and Washington and have examined many witnesses in regard to the Flower claims to mines and other property which he cited as the basis for his operations.

COL. JAMES F. GOOKINS DEAD. Chicago Man Victim of Paralysis on Visit to This City.

Col. James F. Gookins, the son of the late Chief Justice Gookins of Indiana, died yesterday at the Hotel Navarro, Seventh avenue and Thirty-eighth street. He suffered a stroke of apoplexy last Tuesday.
