HAS GELBERT AND GELIBERT

And Hopes to Get Out of Ludlow Street Jail Before It's Time to Die.

The case of Sigmund Gerolwohl, who has been languishing in Ludlow Street Jail since Sept. 3 on the complaint of Fred Hans Rohter for the alleged alienation of Mrs. Rohter's affections, came up yesterday before Justice Gildersleeve in the Supreme Court on a motion by counsel to discharge the prisoner.

Rohter had complained that when he returned from Europe, he found that his wife, who keeps a boarding house at 148 East Sixtieth street, had put a boarder named Sigmund Gerolwohl into his room and ordered him, Rohter, out of the house, saying that she couldn't lose so valuable a boarder.

Subsequently Rohter got possession of some letters, in which his wife was addressed as "My dear fat Lottie" by Gerolwohl, who signed himself "Thy Sissy." So he wants \$25,000.

"Why, your Honor," said Lawyer Fineslitt, appearing for the defendant, "he never had a thought of alienating Mrs. Rohter's affections. He is 70 years old, an old man with a penny. Moreover, Rohter is now living with his wife."

"Is there any reason for keeping the man in jail?" asked Justice Gildersleeve, turning to John C. Stern, counsel for Rohter.

"Yes, better keep him in jail," was the reply. "He has some letters from Mrs. Rohter that she wants to get to complete our case. And we deny that Rohter is living with his wife; he merely gets his breakfast and other meals at her house."

"Here is Mrs. Rohter's affidavit bearing us out," put in Lawyer Fineslitt.

"On account of his peculiar temperament and his age," he read, "the attorney's epistles written to me were really the vapors of an enfeebled mind and were read and looked upon by my other boarders as a huge joke, and never while the defendant had a room in my house was he taken seriously by either myself or the boarders."

"In reply, counsel for Rohter filed a volley of answers to the charges, saying: 'I love you, my dear fat Lottie. He read, "and how I wish I could make you my own before my death. This seems more like a case for a lunatic asylum than for Ludlow Street Jail," remarked Justice Gildersleeve.

"I reserve decision," answered the Judge, coolly.
