

THE KNEISELS HERE AGAIN.

FIRST CONCERT OF THE POPULAR BOSTON QUARTET.

Fragment of Chamber Music by Hugo Wolf Makes a Very Pleasant Impression.

Damrosch Plays the Piano Part in a Dvorak Quintet and Enjoys His Task.

The Kneisel Quartet gave its first concert last night at Mendelssohn Hall. This began the thirteenth season of this admired organization in this city, where its place is firmly established.

The composer is beginning to be known to music lovers on this side of the ocean, as he already is to those on the other, as a writer of excellent, though somewhat overrated songs.

That he was a genius misunderstood and unappreciated is sufficiently proved for romantic minds by the fact that he struggled long and hopelessly with poverty.

His work is a special charm for him. He wrote an "Italian Songbook" containing forty-eight songs inspired by the land of Bocaccio and Dante.

"Italian Serenade" was designed for an orchestra, and it is not a large composition, but is so frank and straightforward in its melodic speech, so brightly written for its mood and without so prettily written for its instruments that most hearers must have wished that the rest of the composition had been evolved in the same manner.

The freshness and independence of the movement were as interesting as its easy avoidance of cheapness without straining after effects utterly foreign to Italian manner. It is the Italy of the shining avenues, the strumming guitar and the languor of passion that Wolf had in mind when he wrote this music.

His performance of the piano part of the quartet was very good indeed. He played the first movement with the light and tender touch. His tone was better in quality with the lid up, but there were passages in which the quantity was just a trifle more than necessary.

His playing was sympathetic and respectful to the ensemble. The Dvorak quintet played last night in the old and good friend. It was interesting to see Mr. Damrosch in the company of the gentlemen from Boston.

WOMAN'S CLAIM ON FLANAGAN

GROSS BLACKMAIL, SAY BREWER'S WIDOW AND HER COUNSEL.

Mrs. Franklin Sued for 80 Weeks' Services as Nurse at \$500 a Week Under an Alleged Agreement With Flanagan—Leave to Amend Complaint Denied.

Supreme Court Justice Clarke denied yesterday an application made by Mrs. Hattie L. Franklin for leave to amend her complaint in the suit she has brought to recover \$40,000 from the estate of Capt. William L. Flanagan, who died in January, 1903. Mrs. Franklin alleges that she contracted, in June, 1901, to pay her \$500 a week for her services as nurse. He did pay her for about seven weeks, \$3,500 in all, but, she says, he neglected to pay her for the remaining eighty weeks before his death.

The executors are Randolph Hurry, Florence A. Flanagan, the widow, and De Witt Flanagan. They deny that the estate owes Mrs. Franklin anything, and allege that the relations between her and Capt. Flanagan were meretricious.

William L. Flanagan was captain of the First Battery, U. S. V., in the Spanish-American war. He was managing director of Flanagan, Nay & Co. and H. Clausen & Son, brewers. He built the Hotel Marie Antoinette, which is still the property of his estate.

In replying to Mrs. Franklin's allegations, Mrs. Flanagan says that the suit is blackmail. Mrs. Flanagan declares that when she heard of her husband's attentions to Mrs. Franklin she and her mother, Mrs. Allen, visited the Broadway Apartments, at 1423 Broadway, where Capt. Flanagan was living. The couple's relations, she says, were in a luxury. Mrs. Flanagan says, as the Captain's mistress. She denies that Mrs. Franklin was a nurse or had any duties as such. Mrs. Flanagan was then making her own arrangements for her future life.

Patrick G. Tighe, who managed Capt. Flanagan's affairs for years says that Capt. Flanagan, while living apart from his wife, met Mrs. Franklin in a house in West Forty-second street, which was afterward raided. He took her on a Southern trip. Then she frequently visited the Broadway Apartments, where she lived with her mother, and they returned from Europe on Dec. 27 and took up apartments in various New York hotels. They passed the winter of 1901-2 in Capt. Flanagan's frequently left her for short periods. At such times Tighe was commissioned to pay Mrs. Franklin's rent and give her money in sums of about \$100 at a time.

LETTER "TO MY WIFE EVELYN"

PRODUCED BY WOMAN WHO IS SUING LOUIS V. BELL.

It Purports to Give Her Certain Securities to Be Held After His Death—Bell's Counsel Says a Man May Change His Mind and His Intended Legacies.

Evelyn M. Clarke, who says she is the wife of Louis V. Bell, the broker, has submitted to the Supreme Court what she says is the agreement Bell gave her in 1890, as follows: NEW YORK, March 2, 1890. To My Wife, Evelyn M. Clarke Bell: In case of my death I want you to send for Mr. Ferris, my secretary, at once. He understands about certain securities that I have deposited in the Garfield Safe Deposit Company, which are yours, principal and interest, and for your own personal use. I hereby give you the same securities, except Mr. Ferris, that during my life I have the privilege of using the same, principal and interest, for my own personal use. Nobody has any knowledge of these securities, as I marked them on my personal note-books to-day as given away, excepting Mr. A. D. Ferris, who likewise on this day has received the same.
