BELL'S VALET QUESTIONED.

About the Travels of Evelyn M. Clarke With the Broker.

Another round was fought yesterday in the Louis V. Bell-Evelyn Clarke marital mix-up. Mr. Bell's lawyers obtained an order a few days ago for the examination, at his home, of Freeman Smallwood, formerly a valet for Mr. Bell, who is said to be dying of consumption. It was represented to the court that Smallwood's condition was such that he might die at any time and that it was of the greatest importance to Mr. Bell that his testimony should be preserved.

The order was granted and arrangements were made to take the man's testimony before Adam Schatz, referee, yesterday afternoon at 3 o'clock. Late on Friday afternoon, however, Mrs. Clarke's attorneys obtained from Justice Amend an order postponing the examination. The order was served on Mr. Bell yesterday morning. It was the first time that such an order had been granted. Royal E. F. Riggs, one of the lawyers on the Boardman, Platt & Soley's side, hurried before Justice Amend, told him that his firm had never consented to an adjournment of the examination, as the Justice seemed to think that it was vitally necessary that the examination should go on.

Mr. Riggs made so plain a statement of the case and put up so stiff a plea for the postponing of the order of adjournment that Justice Amend granted his motion. The examination took place at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the residence of the witness, 325 West Fifty-seventh street. James Russell Soley represented Mr. Bell and C. N. Bovee, Mrs. Clarke.

TWO DEER AND A BEAR.

Young Hunter of Williamsport, Pa., Kills All Three in Three Hours.

WILLIAMSPORT, Pa., Nov. 19.—To kill two deer, the season's limit in Pennsylvania, and one bear in less than three hours is the distinction which has fallen to Ralph Mussina, a young hunter of Williamsport.

Mussina is a member of one of the numerous deer hunting parties which camp on the mountains in the northern part of Leaning county, this particular party being known as the "Boomerang." In a matter of eight days they had seven deer and two bears. Mussina had no luck until the last day. The other members of the party being disabled, he was hunting alone. A fine buck was his first victim, and he shot true to the heart. While carrying it back toward camp another deer bounded over a knoll. Throwing his game to the ground, he shot again. Then he hung both deer up on a tree, and started back for help.

Mussina had gone only a short distance when he came upon a bear eating acorns. He watched Bruin eating for fully ten minutes, and then shot. The bear leaped down the side of the steep hill, and alighted, dead, in the top of a tree. It required a wagon to get his game back to town, although he had been hunting only a couple of hours.

CIVIC FEDERATION PLANS.

WILL FORM AN INTERNATIONAL ORGANIZATION NEXT.

Call for a Convention of the Executive Committee on Dec. 15. Here President to Be Chosen in Senator Hanna's Place—Other Work That Will Be Done.

The executive committee of the National Civic Federation issued a call yesterday for its fourth annual convention, which will be held in this city on Dec. 15. A feature of the meeting will be the appointment of a committee to form an international civic federation. This plan was the outcome of a luncheon tendered by the federation last September to members of the Inter-parliamentary Union.

The suggestion, it is said, has brought encouraging responses from England, Canada, France, Belgium and Germany. The executive committee will hold two business sessions, in the morning and afternoon, and in the evening will entertain at its annual dinner the members of all the departments of the organization. Among those expected to speak at the dinner will be Andrew Carnegie, Archbishop Ireland, Bishop Potter, August Belmont, Cornelius N. Bliss, Oscar S. Straus, John Mitchell, Samuel Gompers, E. E. Clark and others.

The business of the executive committee will include the election of a president to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Senator Marcus A. Hanna. The selection of his successor was intrusted to a sub-committee of twelve, representing employers, wage earners and the general public. The call for the meeting announces the formation of a new department on industrial economics. The members of this new department include 100 editors of the daily newspapers, politico-social magazines, trade papers and labor journals and legal authors, lecturers and the heads of departments of political economy in universities.

The call to the members of the executive committee says in part: "The country is at the threshold of a new era of industrial activity. It is to be hoped that all producers, including both capital and wage earners, as well as all consumers, will share in this revival of prosperity. This new era succeeds a period of depression which has had at least two wholesome results. The water has been squeezed out of inflated securities and unsound investments of values has been reached. Organized labor has gone through an almost parallel succession of inordinate expansion and contraction. During the boom period labor had its organizers everywhere and pressed its demands for a larger share in the increased profits of production. When the industrial reaction came, however, labor found itself extended beyond a sound basis and unable to avoid its share of the hardship caused by the depression. But for both capital and labor the outlook now more hopeful. In all the United States, but one city, Fall River, today suffers from an industrial struggle of any moment. But this situation of comparative inactivity should not blind us to the possibility of elements that tend for either its continuance and intensification or its speedy disruption. There are concentrations of capital that seek and find an established market for their business relations with corresponding or-
