**HELD FOR WIRE TAPPING.**

Three Men Arrested in New Orleans for Trying to Work a Racing Swindle.

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 18.—E. J. Smith as principal and two other men as assistants have been arrested for tapping the racing wire of the Crescent City Jockey Club. The wire, which ran from the race track direct to Cincinnati, belonged to the Cumberland Telephone Company and was leased to the jockey club for the purpose of furnishing the Northern poolrooms with the results of the races. A lineman of the Cumberland company discovered purely by accident that a tap ran from this wire into a room occupied by E. J. Smith, a telegraph operator and formerly a clerk to the police force. Smith, into whose room the wire runs, says that he knew nothing of it, and his mother, whose house it is, says that the wire was put in by an unknown boarder whose name she thinks was Brown. The wire had evidently been tapped some time ago, but the jockey club had no evidence that any poolroom had been raided because of it and thinks that the scheme had not yet been put into practical operation.

**HELD UP IN HIS SALOON.**

Louis Weinreb and His Bartender Put in a State of Fright.

A few minutes before 1 o'clock yesterday morning two excited men ran into the first precinct police station at Newark and said that they had been robbed by hold-up men. They were Louis Weinreb, a saloonkeeper at 120 New Jersey Railroad avenue, and his bartender, Barnett Cohen. They were hardly able to tell their story through excitement, but after a few minutes Weinreb said that while they were getting ready to close the saloon at midnight two strangers with big pistols entered the place quietly and commanded them to hold up their hands. Then one man reached them while the other held the pistols. At first Weinreb said he was robbed of \$76. Then he reduced the estimate to \$20, and finally to \$15, explaining that the robbers got no money from him, but took it from Cohen's pocket. They said that one of the robbers was a tall, dark man and the other was short and fair.



**FOUR MASTER ON JERSEY SAND.**

Her Crew Saved—Crowds Looking Past Her See a Fire at Sea.

BAY HEAD, N. J., Dec. 18.—The large four masted schooner Lizzie H. Brayton, Capt. Kelly, went aground just about opposite the life saving station here at 2 o'clock this morning. The crew, nine all told, including the captain, were landed in the breeches buoy and were cared for at the life saving station here by Capt. Thompson Pierce and his men. It was during the blinding snowstorm which raged all along this part of the Jersey coast last night that the Brayton went ashore. The snowstorm had been for hours so thick that Capt. Kelly had lost his bearings and did not know his dangerous position until he heard the sound of the surf which at that time was breaking pretty heavily. It burst a flare and got

a prompt response to his signal from the life saving men. The vessel struck the sand broadside on and was not damaged by the shock. The life saving crew put off from shore and got within hailing distance of the Brayton. They found that she had settled down comfortably in her sand berth, so they went back to shore and made preparations to land the crew when daylight came. A line was fired over her about 9 o'clock and one after another the crew were drawn ashore through the surf in the breeches buoy. Capt. Kelly being the last to leave his vessel. Although the men were drenched in coming through the surf, they were quickly warmed up at the life saving station and are not likely to be injured by their cold bath. The weather was mild. Capt. Kelly had sailed for twenty-eight years and this was the first mishap at sea he had ever had. The Brayton lies in a dangerous position, but if the weather keeps as moderate as it is now she may get off. Her home port is Boston. She was built in 1881 at Bath, Me., and has a length
