NIAGARA GETTING HARNESS ON

THIS YEAR WILL SEE BIG DOINGS IN POWER DEVELOPMENT.

10,000 Horse-Power Generators Being Constructed—18-Foot Steel Tubes to Carry the Water Being Laid—Power to Go to Toronto—The Canadian Plans.

NIAGARA FALLS, Dec. 31.—The coming year is destined to witness a wonderful addition to the force which man has developed from the waters of Niagara Falls. For the last two years there has been great activity in power development on the Canadian side, and it is probable that a year from to-day will see Canadian power taken from the lead in the electrical horse-power taken from the river currents.

In 1888 the lands about the Horseshoe Fall on the Canadian side were thrown open for park purposes, and ever since there has been a constant letting of franchises by the commissioners of Victoria Park to secure revenue to maintain the free pleasure ground.

At present there are three power companies at work contemplating plans for developing the river's energy. The Canadian Niagara Power Company will develop 110,000 horse-power, the Electrical Development Company of Ontario will develop 125,000 horse-power, and the Ontario Power Company has franchises which will allow it to develop 180,000 horse-power. Thus the franchises of these three companies will permit a total development of 415,000 electrical horse-power, and it is likely that rights for a more extensive development can be secured.

The Canadian Niagara Power Company has the initial section of its installation about ready, and it will not be many days before it is announced from Niagara that the greatest turbines and generators ever built are in successful operation. The plan adopted is similar to that of the Niagara Falls Power Company on the New York side, that is, a wheel pit and tunnel tail-race. The companies are allied.

The wheel pit construction is similar to that on the New York side, but the tunnel is shorter, its length being about 2,200 feet as compared with a length of 7,000 feet of the first tunnel built at the Falls. The portal is close up by the Horseshoe Fall, and when the rush of water plunges from it the current at the base of the fall will feel a new and important influence.

In size the Canadian tunnel is slightly larger than the two, but its shortness makes the development on the Canadian side far more economical than that on the New York side. The power house is of stone, and similar to the big power houses on the New York side.

The leading feature of this development, however, will be the size of the unit adopted for the development. On the New York side the power houses have units of 5,000 horse-power, but in this new Canadian station the unit is to be double that, or 10,000 horse-power. This large unit was adopted for economy's sake, a turbine and generator set which will develop 10,000 horse-power requiring little more space than a set which gave one on a 5,000 horse-power. The generators will be wound for a three phase, 12,000 volt, 25 cycle current, at 250 revolutions a minute, and this will allow the parallel operation of the two plants.

When transmitted to the New York side the current from this big Canadian plant will be passed through transformers and changed to 2,200 volts, two-phase Canadian current, which has the privilege of placing its transmission cables across the river steel arch transmission, and when cables are now laid in conduits ready for the current.

This Canadian company has secured the right of way for a transmission line along the Canadian side between Niagara Falls and Fort Erie, intimating that possibly some of the electric current may be transmitted to Buffalo. The existing field, however, is the city of Toronto, where there is a demand for power, and it is probable that the first Niagara power sent to Toronto will go over a transmission line, the length of which will be about 240 miles, and it will not be many months before the eighty miles between Niagara Falls and Toronto will be covered by the transmission, and when this is accomplished the longest transmission yet will have been effected in connection with the Niagara development. To transmit the current so far, its voltage will be raised to 40,000 or 60,000.

The Electrical Development Company of Ontario, which is developing power in Victoria Park, has also adopted the wheel pit and tunnel method. The wheel pit is now being sunk, and some progress has been made in driving the tunnel, which will be about 2,100 feet long, 24 feet wide and 26 feet high, built in the form of a horseshoe. This tunnel will discharge behind the sheet of water of the Horseshoe Fall. At its upper end two lateral tunnels will extend 105 feet to the ends of the wheel pit and through these lateral tunnels the water from the turbines will reach the main tunnel.

The Ontario Power Company has built two large forebays in Victoria Park above the Victoria Park dam, and is proceeding carefully to avoid inconvenience from ice in winter time. At the lower end of the inner forebay it will set its gatehouse, where the water of the creek will flow into large steel pipes, eighteen feet in diameter, the largest ever used in connection with a power development.

The pipes are built of steel plates riveted together and covered outside with concrete, and then with earth to neutralize the earth pressure. One of these steel flumes in its slope is over 600 feet long. It is expected to deliver 2,000 cubic feet of water a second into a spillway near old Table Rock, close to the center of the high bank. From this point the water will be taken by conduits to a power house at the water's edge in the gorge, very close to the base of the old waterfall. In this station the unit of development will be 10,000 horse-power, and the water from each steel flume is expected to develop 60,000 horse-power. There will be three flumes, making the capacity 180,000.

The first section of this power station has been built. The work was put on in early in December and the first section of the company's installation will probably be in operation early next summer. Markets for the power will be sought on both sides of the river.

THE PUSHAUT FURRIER.

A New Type of Dealer in Furs Appears in the Shopping District.

Pushcart loads of furs are common enough at this season in the streets of the East Side, where pushcart men sell pretty much everything that anybody could need, either for personal or for household use, but they are new in the central shopping district, where, however, a few have appeared this winter, drawn up to the curb in side streets just off Sixth avenue.

The pushcart dealer in furs sets up stakes at the corners of his cart, draws cords between them, and hangs furs on the cords and sticks muffs on the tops of the stakes. Then he covers the floor of the cart body with furs of various sorts, so that the cart itself is hidden from view under his amply displayed stock.

The furs offered are of kinds calculated to appeal to slender purses and a pushcart load of furs makes a curious object to those who observe it in new.
