

EFFORTS TO INDICT GRAFTERS.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL MOODY SUPERVISING THE INQUIRY.

Has a Long Conference With District Attorney Beach—Extraordinary Precautions Being Taken to Prevent a Leak of Yesterday's Cotton Report.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—Attorney-General Moody, who returned here from Massachusetts by way of Oyster Bay, expressly for the purpose of supervising the legal investigation of the cotton scandal in the Department of Agriculture, spent the day in his office at the Department of Justice.

He had a long conference with District Attorney Beach, and the effort to secure indictments by the Federal Grand Jury was discussed in all its phases. The Grand Jury met this morning and adjourned until Aug. 15, when it is hoped that some witnesses who are now at a distance from Washington will be on hand to testify in the cotton scandal.

John Hyde, the cotton statistician of the Department of Agriculture, whose presence here is especially desired, will have returned from England by that time is uncertain.

Attorney-General Moody said this afternoon that the best effort possible would be made by the Department of Justice to secure indictments against guilty persons in connection with the cotton scandal, but he would make no prediction of the result.

After his conference with Mr. Moody, District Attorney Beach returned to the State Department, where he had a long talk with Acting Secretary Adee. Questions of extradition, which were considered by the two officials, were not discussed.

The cotton report made public today was the first prepared in the Department of Agriculture since the manipulation of the market was disclosed.

As the Department officials have begun to suspect everybody, the most extraordinary precautions were taken to prevent irregularities. Barricades were thrown up and police were stationed at the entrance to the division with orders to allow no one to pass except Secretary Wilentz and his staff.

HIS STORAGE BATTERY READY

EDISON SAYS HE HAS SOLVED ELECTRIC PROPULSION.

Within a Few Weeks a Big Factory for Turning Out the Batteries Will Be Started—Chiefly for Auto-Trucks for Commercial Use—Cooper Hewitt's Help

ORANGE, N. J., Aug. 3.—In announcing this afternoon that he had solved the problem of the electric propulsion of auto vehicles, Thomas A. Edison took occasion to discredit recent extravagant assertions attributed to him concerning his electric storage battery, which he says he has perfected.

Mr. Edison said that within a few weeks work would be started on an immense factory building on Lakeside avenue. He said that the recent statement that his battery would drive an automobile at the rate of 35 miles an hour from New York to Philadelphia and back on a single charge of the battery was untrue.
