

SCHUYLKILL ARSENAL FRAUDS

INSPECTOR AND EXAMINER TO BE DISMISSED.

Contractor Morris Bush Will Be Prosecuted and Compelled to Repeal Inferior Articles—Provision for Safeguarding the Government in the Future.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—As a result of the investigation of the irregularities in the filling of contracts at the Schuylkill Arsenal...

The Judge Advocate General of the army has been ordered to prepare charges against Morris Bush, a contractor, and Charlton and send them to the Department of Justice.

The only other name mentioned is that of Edwin H. Taggart, a contractor, who, in case any inferior articles are discovered to have been furnished by him, shall be required to replace the goods.

Gen. Oliver also orders that a careful inspection shall be made of all goods sold to the Government by Morris Bush, and a demand will be made for the replacement of any inferior articles that may be found.

The report of Major S. F. Strong, Inspector-General's Department, which has been working on the Schuylkill frauds for some months, is approved entirely and Gen. Oliver's orders are based on it.

Further provision for the safeguarding of the Government is made by Gen. Oliver as follows:

"In the advertisement for bids for contracts for an Government supplies each bidder shall furnish the name and place of business of the manufacturer or manufacturer who will furnish the goods."

"The officers of the Schuylkill Arsenal in particular a commissioned officer shall personally and continually supervise the inspection of all articles tendered under contract and to their acceptance."

"All bidders who may have heretofore failed to furnish the goods taken into the Schuylkill Arsenal under contract have been left entirely in the hands of subordinate inspectors and examiners. It was hereby the great care of the Government is charged with having bribed the inspectors to allow the inferior goods to be accepted."

Orders have been issued also by Gen. Oliver for a rigid inspection of Quartermaster's depots in various parts of the country. Officers of the army will be called immediately to report on the depots.

"The depots to be investigated are in New York, Philadelphia, Boston, New Orleans, San Francisco, Seattle and Jeffersonville, Ind."

"I have been married to two men and I am not afraid to own it," said she, "but I never even heard of this man St. Clair, who is said to be my husband."

"My name is Heloise de Armas. I am born in Pueblo, Mexico. I am an actress. I was first married to Louis Nagelto, who works in Tiffany's. That was on July 30, 1903, and he got me for \$100.00."

"My marriage to Francois was an accident. I didn't know what I was doing. It was on July 21, 1904, that I met Louis in a saloon in Twenty-seventh street. Louis proposed that we get married and I agreed."

"We went to the Rev. John Lloyd Lee, pastor of the Westminster Presbyterian Church, at Seventh avenue and Fifty-third street, and he married us. I was in such a condition that I couldn't sign my name to the marriage register and had to go around and so next day."

"When I was in condition to realize what I had done I said to Francois: 'I can't live with you. I have a husband already.'"

"That was no difference," he replied. I told him I would have to see my first husband and if he didn't care I would go back. He was indifferent by that time and didn't care, so I lived with Francois about a year.
