

FRANCHISE MARYLAND'S ISSUE

GORMAN'S FIGHTING POSITION TO BAR STATE REFORMERS.

Senator Gorman for the first time takes the floor of the Senate in opposition to Governor's Initiative Franchise of the Proposed Law.

Senator Gorman, of Maryland, is now in the line of a campaign which is now being conducted in every State of the Union. He is the only one of the candidates who has not made an announcement to the effect that he will discontinue his campaign and support the initiative franchise.

Under the law providing registration a property is required to be an affirmative act. This is to say that two of the four can turn down an applicant, but there must consent to register him.

Following are the alternative qualifications which under the proposed amendment must be made good before the law can be registered after he has completed with the national and State laws as a citizen.

First. A person able to read any section of the Constitution of the State as admitted by the officers of registration and to give a reasonable explanation of the same, or, if unable to read such section, to give a reasonable explanation of the same to him by the registration officers.

Second. A person who on the first day of January, 1860, or prior thereto was entitled to vote under the laws of this State or of any other State of the United States when he last resided.

Third. Any male individual descendant of such last named person as may be the twenty-second, twenty-third or over in the line of descent.

A person not thus qualified by coming under some of the above descriptions shall be entitled to register as a qualified voter or be qualified to vote.

The first qualification is the one to which the naturalized citizen raises objection. It is one that is under the second section, which is generally referred to as the grandfathers' clause. It will be necessary for him to say that he or his father or grandfather could have voted in 1860, and the registers must accept him, but the blacks and foreigners cannot say as much, and hence they must explain a section in the Constitution. It makes only those coming of age in 1860. After that year every American born youth reaching the age of 21 must comply with the requirements of the first section. It is claimed by the framers of the amendment that the last provision was necessary in order to avoid conflicting with the national Constitution.

The proposed amendment is being contested, directly so as to meet every constitutional objection that might be advanced in the Supreme Court of the United States, and although credited to Mr. John P. Poe, because he explained its provisions, it is said to have been the handiwork of a coterie of jurists at Washington.

When first proposed at the legislative session in 1904 Governor Gorman strenuously objected to it. He insisted that every taxpayer, white or black, should be allowed to vote. The only party left to consider is the Municipal Ownership party, with W. B. Hearst at its head.

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MARYLAND TRUST PLAN WINS.

Fifteen Thousand Shares Have Been Bought in Favor of Reorganization.

BALEMORE, Oct. 13.—When the court of the shares of Maryland Trust stock, deposited with the Safe Deposit and Trust Company, under the reorganization plan, was completed last night, it was found that enough stock had been turned over to insure the success of the bond plan.

Under this plan James Stover and a New York syndicate will get control of the company. It is understood that the number deposited exceeded 15,000 shares of the company.

There is a well founded report that the Maryland Trust Company will be ready for business. The creditors will get at least \$2,000,000, but some of the large ones have agreed to continue to deposit with the institution.

CALL OTHER PARTIES BAD.

Socialists Hold a General Denunciation Mass Meeting.

A mass meeting of the Socialist party, which was the Social Democratic party until last week, was held last night in Carnegie Hall to ratify its city ticket. The hall, except the gallery, was filled. National Organizer Wilkins was chairman.

Morris Hillquit, the national committee man, began the night with an explanation of the party's enforced change of name and then soaked the other political parties. Tammany Hall, he said, was centered in an ex-slutkeeper, the Citizens' Union was controlled by an amateur reformer in evening dress, and Jerome was a man who announced that he had his own endorsement and would accept a nomination from anybody else.

"Municipal ownership hung in the air for one time and at last fell into the hands of William R. Hearst," (Hisses.) Tammany Hall is not hypocritical. The Republican party is simply an aid of Tammany Hall. Jerome is an honest, sensational, erratic man, who has shown no sympathy with the cause of labor. HARVESTER TRUST FIGHTS. Meets Australian Attacks by a Cut in Prices to Crush Opposition. Special Case Reported to the Sec. MELBOURNE, Oct. 13.—The American harvester trust has made a counter move to the action of Sir William Lyne, Minister of Trade and Customs, in raising the invoice value of harvesters from £38 to £65. The company has reduced the retail price to £70, which enables purchasers to save 12 1/2 per cent. on each machine. The Age says it is probable that further reductions will be made until the Australian makers are crushed. Similar tactics are being followed in New Zealand, where Prime Minister Seddon has referred the matter to a special conference of employers and employees to be held in November. MAYOR TO SPEAK OFFENER. Likely to Alter His Programme of Only a Dozen Speeches or So. Mayor McClellan is to begin his campaign on Thursday night when Tammany holds its ratification meeting. The other speakers at that meeting will be Herman A. Metz, Patrick McGowan and James W. Osborne. The Tammany campaign committee, of which James W.
