At the Twenty-third Street Theatre Murray Carson, the English playwright-actor, and his company will make their first vaudeville appearance.


The Fays and their "thausaturgy" exhibition continues to head the bill at Hammerstein's.

TROOPS GATHER AT FORT RILEY

Army and National Guard Join on the Plains of Kansas in Manoeuvres on a Large Scale Which Will Test the Newest Military Devices.

FORT RILEY, Kan., Aug. 11.—Troops have begun to arrive at Fort Riley to take part in the combined manoeuvres of the army and the National Guard.

August 12 to 19—Arkansas, with two regiments of infantry.

August 19 to 26—Kansas, with two regiments of infantry and one battery.

August 26 to September 2—Missouri, with three regiments of infantry.

September 3 to 9—Iowa, with one regiment of infantry and one hospital corps.

September 10 to 16—Oklahoma, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

September 17 to 23—Nebraska, with two regiments of infantry and one battery.

September 24 to 30—Colorado, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

September 31 to 7—Montana, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

October 8 to 14—Wyoming, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

October 15 to 21—Idaho, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

October 22 to 28—Utah, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

October 29 to 5—Arizona, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

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
October 13 to 19—Texas, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

October 20 to 26—Louisiana, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

October 27 to 3—Mississippi, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

October 4 to 10—Alabama, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.

October 11 to 17—Georgia, with one regiment of infantry, one hospital corps, one signal corps and one engineering corps.



STARTING ON A MARCH.

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The Kansas farmers coveted the land included in the post and sent a petition to Congress asking that all but a few hundred acres be opened to settlement.

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The actual field work will begin with some explanations and reviews. The militia will be instructed in the objects of the gathering and there will be active field operations.

The manoeuvres will begin with a campaign in which part of the force of 10,000 men will endeavor to repel an invading army.

The tactical exercises will relate to drilling men in the use of guns and swords, to company, regimental and battalion movements and to giving support to a company or regiment.

A hospital corps will be attached to each regiment and will have six beds and everything needed for the care of the wounded men.

The Signal Service will put into actual use wireless telegraphy. Automobiles will be employed for the rapid transfer of supplies and the repairing of breaks in the telegraph and telephone wires which will, of course, be made by the troops detailed to act as the enemy at every opportunity.

The Signal Service expects to use a war balloon to get information of the enemy's position.

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The Government has spent more than a million dollars here for buildings and the improvements needed for permanency.

As much more will be expended in the next three years and then the post will rank with any in the world, except as regards its lack of fortifications.

Water pipes have been laid in the camp; the Union Pacific has built extra tracks in order to carry freight and excursionists; the post office force has been trebled; the express messenger has two extra assistants—it all means great activity during the two months that the manoeuvres are to continue.

In the manoeuvres the Infantry, Cavalry, Light Artillery, the Commissary, Quartermaster's and Medical departments, as well as the Engineers, Signal Corps and Ordnance Corps, will take part. Strategical
