Following an order issued yesterday by Acting Police Commissioner Waldo, revoking the appointments of about 300 special policemen of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, and taking into consideration the attitude of Deputy Police Commissioner O'Keefe and the police in Brooklyn borough, that forbids ejections of passengers who refused to pay two fares to Coney Island would be regarded as cases of assault and so treated by the police, the B. R. T. officials last night annulled the entire trolley service to Coney Island.
