LET CITY SUPPORT CHILDREN. Two Men in Arrears to Institutions Sent to the Penitentiary for Three Months. Two men were sentenced yesterday by Justice McAvoy in Special Sessions to three months each in the penitentiary for failing to pay the sums assessed upon them for support of their children committed to the institutions. John Devine, 40 years old, of West Fifty-third street, a casual worker who makes \$5 a day, had three of his children committed to the Dominican Convent three years ago and owes \$600 arrears to their support. His wife told the Children's society that he not only was not giving anything for the children but was not giving her a cent, spending all he made for rum.

TAMSEN FOR SCHMITTBERGER. German-American Delegation at the Mayor's Office to See Fair Play. A delegation of German-Americans called on Acting Mayor McGowan yesterday and handed him a set of resolutions which had been adopted the night before at a meeting held at 101 Avenue A, and which stated that "Whereas we, citizens of New York," had reason to believe that the trial of Police Inspector Schmittberger "will not be fair and just to him," the Mayor ought to see to it that the inspector was not unfairly dealt with.

CLARINET CASE THROWN OUT. Bandmaster Luciano Contorno Was Threatened in Wheeling, W. Va., He Says. Bandmaster Luciano Contorno appeared in the West Side police court yesterday to accuse Riccardo Toggi, his former clarinetist, of threatening him with violence. Toggi, during his night behind the bars, had been coaxed out of the bright red uniform that he wore when arrested on Monday by a pathetic appeal from Maestro Giuseppe Yando, in whose band he has played recently. He appeared shivering in a boy's size summer serge which seemed to miss fire all around, Magistrate Mayo wielded the baton yesterday under guise of a gavel.

STRETCHER COMPLAINT WINS. Julie A. Eddy Gets Verdict for \$7,500 for Injuries by Fall From Trolley. An award of \$7,500 damages was made yesterday to Miss Julie A. Eddy by a jury in the Supreme Court at Newark against the North Jersey Street Railway Company. The action was brought by Miss Eddy because of injuries sustained by a fall from a Clinton Avenue trolley car on May 25, 1906. Miss Eddy was carried into court on a stretcher and was attended by a trained nurse. Her appearance led Chief Justice Gummers to remark that this was the need of a theatrical display. She sued for \$10,000.

GIBBONS TO FRENCH BISHOPS. The Cardinal to Send a Letter Assuring Them of American Support. Cardinal Gibbons is preparing another letter to be addressed to the Bishops of France in the name of the American hierarchy. The letter will be supplemented by notes from each of the Archbishops and Bishops throughout the country, who will speak in behalf of themselves individually and of their flocks. Another letter will be prepared later and sent out in behalf of the Catholic laymen of America.
