

MISS IRWIN MARTIN SUING.

HER THIRD ACTION AGAINST A RAILROAD CORPORATION.

The Defence Would Like to Show That Injuries She Sues On Now Were the Injuries She Received as a Child in Her First Accident—Can't Sleep on Her Back.

Miss Jeanne C. Irwin Martin, a good looking young woman of unusual education, was examined in the Supreme Court yesterday before Justice Kellogg and a jury at the trial of her third suit against a railroad corporation for accident damages.

In addition to the injury to her mouth Miss Martin says that she sustained a severe shock, which rendered her unable to resume her occupation as a special writer on scientific and other subjects.

Miss Martin testified to these damages under examination by her counsel, Hugh Gordon Miller. She declared that she had been in perfect health for some years prior to the time of the accident and that she had completely recovered from previous injuries received in railway accidents.

Herbert Smyth, for the company, cross-examined Miss Martin about her previous railway accidents. She said that in 1889, when she was quite a child, she had been injured in a collision on the New York, New Haven and Hartford road.

IN THE U. S. SUPREME COURT.

Stock Transfer Tax Case Advanced—Rebate Case Against the Great Western.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—The Supreme Court to-day advanced for argument the case involving the constitutionality of the stock transfer tax of New York and set it for hearing on December 10. The case was brought by Albert J. Hatch, a Wall Street broker, who was arrested for selling 100 shares of St. Paul and a like number of Southern Railway stock without affixing the required stamps.

The court affirmed the judgment of the New York Circuit Court dismissing the suit brought by the James McCreary Realty Corporation to recover \$18,000 from the Equitable National Bank as rent of the building at 303 Broadway, which the bank occupied up to the time of its failure in 1904.

The lower court held that the lease executed by the officers of the bank was void because the bank had not been authorized by the Controller of the Currency to do business although the lease was subsequently ratified by them.

The court was asked to advance for early hearing the appeal of the Interstate Commerce Commission from the judgment of the United States Circuit Court for the Northern District of Illinois, dismissing a bill brought by the commission to compel the Chicago Great Western and other railroads to reduce their rates on meat products to the equality formerly existing with livestock rates.

The commission alleged that the combination to reduce the rates was a discrimination against the Chicago packing house industry and in favor of the Omaha and Kansas City packers, but the court held that it was without power to correct the evil. The commission thereupon brought an appeal to the Supreme Court.

In presenting the motion to advance the case Solicitor-General Hoy suggested that it be heard some time in February. The court took the matter under advisement.

The court was asked to advance for early hearing a case involving the right of a customer when his broker has gone into bankruptcy to take up stocks which he had previously bought on margin and were being carried for him by the broker.

The attempt of Carl S. Reynolds of Lyme, Conn. to test the validity of an antitrust statute, which in effect prohibits the sale of articles from a wagon or temporary stand within one mile of the place where a fair was being held, was successful.
