

BEST RACEHORSES ENTERED.

RICH SPRING HANDICAPS AT TRACT STAR PERFORMERS.

A. B. Keene Will Try for Suburban, Brooklyn and Belmont with "Pink Three-Year-Olds—Whitney—Tanya—Upon—Rejuvenated Cripples—The Racers' Records.

More entries have been received for the three big spring handicaps—the Suburban, the Brooklyn and the Brighton, each one mile and a quarter—than ever before in the history of the American turf. For the Suburban, worth \$20,000, eighty-four horses have been named to start, while the Brooklyn, another \$20,000 race, has attracted seventy-five and the \$25,000 Brighton seventy-eight. Every racehorse of quality that is included in these lists, which means that the Eastern tracks will provide sport of unusual quality this year.

James R. Keene, who headed the winning owners last season, has entered nine horses in the different events. Kuroki, a four-year-old Commando colt, has been entered in each of the handicaps as the best representative of that age in the Keene stable. The other three three-year-olds, a majority of them having some of the most valuable two-year-old stakes last season. Ballot, the Viceroy—Cerrito colt, who won the Matron Stakes at Belmont Park last fall, after finishing third to Salvidere and De Mund in the Junior Champion, second to De Mund in the Flatbush and second to Sewell in the Great Eastern, is also in the three handicaps.

Court Dress, by Disguise—Hampton Belle, the best two-year-old filly last season, has a triple engagement, too. So has Gretna Green, by Ben Brush—Runaway Girl, who won several important stakes off the reel last spring and was then turned out for the rest of the campaign. Peter Pan, by Commando—Cinderella, who won the Flash and the Hopeful Stakes at Saratoga, only to be soundly beaten in the Futurity, has not been named for either the Suburban or the Brooklyn, but will receive a special preparation for the Brighton, which will be run in July. Peter Pan, up to his defeat in the Futurity, was looked upon as the equal of the champion Salvidere, and even now Mr. Keene believes that this son of Commando will prove superior to Salvidere as a three-year-old.

Supernum, another Commando colt out of Anomaly, has been entered in the Suburban and the Brooklyn, but not in the Brighton. Philander, a son of Ben Brush—Pink Domino, who did not come to hand until late in the fall, when he showed that he liked a route by winning the Election Day Handicap, one mile and a furlong, at Aqueduct, is eligible for all the handicaps, and will have an early start. Grimaldi, a colt by Disguise—Calico, who did not do much racing last year, is in the Suburban and the Brooklyn, but not in the Brighton. Vell, a very fast filly by Disguise—Burrice, is in three events and much is expected of her, as Trainer Rowe did not start her until the last day of the season, when she won two sensational races.

With Mr. Keene, therefore, holding a very strong hand, the Payne Whitney have named four uncertain representatives to carry the "light blue, brown cap" in the handicap. Three former cripples, Burgomaster, Artful and Tanya, have been named, together with Ironsides, by Meddler—Hanoana, a rather ordinary four-year-old.

Burgomaster, a four-year-old by Hamburg—Hurley Bury, would probably have been the champion three-year-old last season if he had not bowed to London just after winning the classic Belmont Stakes in May. He was easily the best two-year-old in 1906, and when he went to the post last spring he was the typical racehorse—in fact many good judges predicted then and there that he would make as clean a sweep of the rich three-year-old stakes as did the memorable Sysonby the year before. But the hard luck which seemed to follow Mr. Whitney's stable manifested itself when Burgomaster blasted the hopes of his owner and trainer by going wrong. John W. Rogers, however, sent the great Hamburg colt to the farm, where he was bred and blistered, preparatory to a long race, which finds him at present as sound as a dollar—so sound, in fact, that Mr. Whitney and Trainer Rogers feel sure that Burgomaster will be able to race again. Unwilling to start the campaign with him too soon, however, Rogers did not put the Hamburg colt in the Brooklyn, but named him for the Suburban and the Brighton, in both of which he will, in all probability, be asked to pick up top weight by Handicapper W. S. Vosburgh.

Like Burgomaster, the five-year-old mare by Hamburg—Martha II, dealt the Whitney stable a hard blow when she showed signs of a weak tendon just when she looked to have the Brooklyn Handicap at her mercy last year. Artful as a two-year-old won the Futurity, but she did not do much racing as a three-year-old until Rogers sent her after the Brighton Handicap, which she won in a romp. There was talk of matching her against the wonderful Sysonby then, but Artful, just prior to the running of the Brighton Cup, showed unmistakably weak underpinning, which caused her to be thrown out of training immediately.

Since winning the Brighton Handicap in 1905, therefore, Artful has not been to the races. She was fired and blistered at the time that Burgomaster was similarly treated, and has apparently recovered her sense of limb as far as can be learned, but whether after her long absence from active racing, she can display her old form is a question that Artful cannot answer just now. At any rate, Artful has not been named to go in the Brooklyn, being reserved for the other handicaps, because of Rogers's desire to take plenty of time with this famous mare. Tanya, who won the Belmont Stakes in 1906, but who did not race at all last year because of weak legs, has been nominated exclusively for the Brighton, the Meddler—Handspan mare not giving so much promise as her stable companions, Artful and Tanya, in the coming weight allotments, will stand pretty close to the top of the list.

Diamond Jim Brady commands attention by entering his \$45,000 Commando in all three events. Accountant, now a four-year-old, by Filigrane—Reckon, was the biggest money winner on the turf last year. He made practically a clean sweep of the three-year-old stakes and other rich events, including the Annual Champion, Saratoga Derby, Brighton Derby, Lawrence Realization, Tidal Stakes and other races. He was retired by Matt Allen after his victory in the Annual Champion, and is perfectly sound in every way. In all probability he will not be treated leniently by the handicapper when the weights are assigned.

Brady and Allen have put the three-year-old Fountainblu, by Oddfellows—Feroz, who captured the Triumph Stakes for two-year-olds at a mile over the Brighton track in October, in both the Suburban and the Brighton, but not in the Brooklyn. Many greatly believe that this colt has been greatly overrated, and that Brady would be put up \$25,000 in cash for him got decidedly the worst of the bargain. Oiseau, by Ormus—Kitty Gunn, now a five-year-old, did not amount to much last season,

but in 1905 he ranked third to Sysonby and Artful in the three-year-old list. Brady paid \$27,500 for Oiseau as a two-year-old, when the colt looked to be of much promise. Oiseau is not in the Brooklyn, but has been named for the other two events. Waterlight, a five-year-old son of Watercross—Lumina, has been named for the Brooklyn only by Brady and Allen. At one time he was believed to be a good racehorse, but somehow he did not pan out.

August Belmont's entry includes Blandly, a five-year-old son of Hastings—Belinda, a three-year-old by Hastings—Orinta, whose best race last year was a victory in the White Plains Handicap at Belmont Park, and who is similarly entered, and the four-year-old mare Tiptoe, by Hastings—Tartar, essentially a sprinter. The other three three-year-olds, a coming three-year-old champion in the estimation of many competent judges, has been named by John E. Madden, who owns a half interest in the three races. Salvidere, by Belvidere—Sallie of Navarre, was easily the best of the two-year-olds last year. He is eligible for all the handicaps; Okenite, \$50,000 in stakes for Messrs. Hitchcock and Madden, his triumphs being scored in the Annual Champion Stakes, the Century Handicap, the Saratoga Special, the Winged Foot Handicap, the Brighton Junior Stakes and the Montauk Stakes. At these races Salvidere showed all the qualities of a racehorse. He picked up heavy weights, met the best two-year-olds in training and won the marvelous ability to win from behind with brilliant run through the homestretch. Madden retired him after he won the Junior Champion at Gravesend and sent him to Little Rock, Ark., for the winter.

F. R. Hitchcock has named Dandelion, by Hamburg—Pansy, for all the handicaps, while he has named a colt, a sister to Tanya, exclusively for the Brooklyn. Dandelion was the "champion hard luck horse" last year. He ran second, beaten a half length by the Suburban, was beaten off in the Brighton because of crowding, took a tumble in the Commonwealth, was second to Klokak, who won by a neck, in the Brooklyn, and was also second to Grapple in the Metropolitan, beaten three parts of a length. Later in the season Dandelion was sold to the Suburban, where he captured the rich Invincible Handicap at the beach, together with the Saratoga Handicap and the Delaware Handicap at the Springs. Go Between, the six-year-old son of Meddler—Indy, who won the Suburban last June and created a notable scandal because of the discovery that he was a half brother to the champion, was also second to Grapple in the Metropolitan, beaten three parts of a length. Later in the season Dandelion was sold to the Suburban, where he captured the rich Invincible Handicap at the beach, together with the Saratoga Handicap and the Delaware Handicap at the Springs. Bedouin won the Century Stakes, one mile and a half, last September, beating Fine Cloth a head, but he was subsequently beaten in the Annual Champion by Beon-clere, a three-year-old, by Salvatore—Phida, who ran behind the great Roseben when he lowered the world's record for seven furlongs to 1:22, has been put into the Brooklyn. He won a number of good races at the above distance last fall, and ran as if he liked a longer route.

Lucky Jack entered his good three-year-old Frank Gill, by imported Collar, in the Suburban Handicap. Gill came to hand late in the year, when he beat older horses at a mile and a half. He was rated as one of the most promising two-year-olds in training, and if nothing happens to him he will be a factor in many events. Buttling, also owned by McGinnis, has not been to the races since 1905, when he was severely cut down. Since then McGinnis has been doing his best to cure the colt and he has recovered entirely from his injury. He is entered for the Brooklyn. Buttling is a five-year-old by Star Ruby—Lalavava, who was named for a former Sheriff of Kings county.

Coy Maid, the five-year-old Kingston mare owned by the Kenilworth Stable, has been entered exclusively for the Suburban Handicap. She won several important handicaps from good horses last season, and is one of the most consistent performers on the turf. Conville, the Deudonia, a three-year-old who was sold by Newton Bennington to F. Hitchcock, Jr., and to be disposed of again for \$100,000 to Louis Cella, is also carried as a probable starter in the Brighton race at the beach. Electioneer, the winner of the Futurity and Produce Stakes last year, is not in the Brooklyn, but will probably be seen in one of the other handicaps. He is a three-year-old by Viceroy—Quail, a half brother to Tommy Atkins, and William Lakeland, in the Brighton Handicap at the beach, together with the Saratoga Handicap and the Delaware Handicap at the Springs. Tangle won the Republic at Saratoga, a mile and a quarter, in 2:05.

Whitey Langdon's Flip Flap, a four-year-old mare by Handicapper, who was won by Holcher for the Brighton Cup and is now a seven-year-old, is in the Brighton Handicap and is worth remembering, as she can go a route and is game to the core. W. B. Jennings's Proper, by Prestonpan—Prim II, is now a seven-year-old, and was the Cup Preliminary but was soundly beaten by Holcher and Flip Flap in the cup race at the beach. He has been named to go only in the Suburban and the Brighton. He has been running in the big handicaps for several years, and he might have won at least one or two of them had it not been for his disastrous fall at the post, which is chronic with him.

George C. Bennett's good mare Dishabile, by King's Counsel—Night Gown, has been put in all the handicaps and may be a stakeholder. She can go well at any distance with all kinds of weight up and is a powerful stretch runner. Another excellent mare is Sam Hildreth's Logistilla, by Logistilla—Searg, who is similarly engaged. C. C. McAffery has entered the five-year-old Mr. Leggo, by Purser—D. Light, a stakes winner on the Coast, in the Suburban and the Brooklyn. Sydney Page's Cairngorm, who, it was reported, was sold to J. B.
