

AMERICA'S AUTO INDUSTRY.

WE NOW LEAD THE WORLD IN THE NUMBER MANUFACTURED.

Last Year's Output Was Valued at \$100,000,000, Nearly Equal to That of Horse Drawn Vehicles...

The value of the automobiles manufactured in this country last year is estimated to be \$100,000,000.

Express companies have adopted the automobile for local delivery purposes, and beer wagons are now being driven by motor in nearly every city.

M. Faroux, a French statistician who is regarded as an authority on automobile matters, says that about 550,000 motor cars have been manufactured in the nine years since the experiment of self-propelled road vehicles first succeeded.
