

**SANDOVAL AGAIN ON THE JOB**

**FIGHTING FOR HONDURAS, AS IT HAPPENS NOW.**

As it is: Guerra! Guerra! He is Not So particular which side he is on—Last heard of When Panama Expelled Him on Suspicion—New York Knows Him Well.

By far the most interesting news from a local point of view that has come from Nicaragua or Honduras since those republics began their war was the announcement made yesterday that Gen. Francisco Ruiz Sandoval is fighting under the Honduran standard. The old General's friends in New York have had no word from him since his expulsion from Panama, where he was arrested last August, soon after his arrival in this city with seventeen other Generals, charged with conspiring against the young but sophisticated Republic.

Gen. Sandoval is a Mexican by birth and a soldier of fortune by profession; an irreconcilable to-day, a Government defender tomorrow. It may or not prove the outcome of the Nicaraguan-Honduran conflict, but the truth is that in all his battles he has never fought on the winning side. He is about 50 years old now, but physically sound and active. Gen. Sandoval is not large of stature—about 5 feet 5 inches in height—but he is fearless warrior.

Many persons who passed the Produce Exchange in the year or two preceding last August may have observed a man of swarthy complexion with black hair and mustache and piercing eyes, wearing a large sombrero and either rolling or smoking a cigarette. That was Gen. Sandoval, who made his headquarters in that part of town, waiting for "something to turn up." Unfortunately Gen. Sandoval has no literary talent; if he had he could write an autobiography that would read like a fine piece of fiction. He has fought in many countries and his name is known a his hemisphere wherever Spanish is spoken from the Andes to the Antilles.

But Gen. Sandoval, like many another military genius, has made mistakes. One of these, which nearly cost him his head and made him an exile from his native country, was an attempt to overthrow President Porfirio Diaz of Mexico. President Diaz in his twenty odd years of rule in Mexico has been called on to suppress more serious uprisings than that organized by Gen. Sandoval. Somewhere in the Government archives in Mexico City a document signed by the Chief Executive which offers \$5,000 reward for the capture of Sandoval.

Another ill starred venture in which the General played the leading role was undertaken about five years ago in Venezuela. Gen. Sandoval had enlisted in the cause of Colombian Liberals, who were trying by force of arms to overthrow the President of Colombia. He was in command of a division on the Isthmus. The insurrectionists had two gunboats, and the command of Gen. Sandoval extended to these. One night he ordered the captains of the two vessels to proceed under full steam for the Venezuelan coast. His orders were obeyed without question, and when the shores of Colombia had been left behind he explained for the first time that he was now on his way to make war on President Castro of Venezuela, and that the Colombians under him must help. The Liberals of Colombia, for whom Gen. Sandoval was fighting, were friendly to President Castro, and were even receiving aid from him for their insurrection, but that made no difference to Sandoval. His squadron arrived at Aracabo, but without waiting to receive the usual proclamation that is essential to all well regulated revolutions the Venezuelan authorities arrested Sandoval before a shot had been fired. President Castro was also compelled to impound the two gunboats of his friends, the Colombian Liberals. After a brief stay in prison Sandoval was liberated, whereupon he returned to New York.

During the Spanish-American war the Mexican fighter tried to join the Spanish army in Cuba, but military experts are now of the opinion that had he succeeded in
