F. Augustus Heineze authorized the announcement that the firm would not make an assignment. Peter Zuecher, of counsel for the firm, corroborated this statement.

Whenever the president shall ascertain that a member has failed to meet his engagements or is insolvent or that a firm registered upon the exchange has failed to meet its engagements or is insolvent, and that such member or such firm has neglected to comply with the requirements of the preceding article, he shall immediately advise the exchange.

BANKER BLITZ ARRESTED. Another Complication Out of the Arrest of Note Broker Ullman in September.

Henry Blitz, who does a banking business under the name of Henry Blitz & Co., at 7 Pine street, was arrested yesterday at 127th street and Claremont avenue charged with the larceny of two \$5,000 checks on the Farmers Loan and Trust Company.

Detectives Dalley and Collins, who arrested Blitz, say that the complaint against him arises from the arrest on September 19 of Oscar Ullman. Ullman's arrest was caused by Garrett B. Linderman of 43 Exchange place. Linderman said in his complaint that he gave Ullman \$30,000 worth of promissory notes to negotiate and Ullman failed to turn over the notes of the money.

When Minnie Brothers of 112 East Sixty-first street gave \$10,000 bail for Ullman, she insisted on security that would cover the amount of Ullman's debt. Ullman gave Blitz the two \$5,000 checks to use for that purpose.

Ullman was honorably discharged by Magistrate Wahle on September 25, and when the note broker made his demand on Blitz for the return of the checks he could get no satisfaction, it is said. Ullman was arrested near his home, 540 Riverside Drive. Blitz, the detective said, asked Ullman to step upstairs with him and get the checks, but the detective would not permit a settlement of the case and arrested Blitz.

Blitz's lawyer, Jesse S. Epstein of 329 Broadway, got Minnie Brothers to give the same bail for Blitz that he gave for Ullman. Magistrate Wahle accepted it late last night in the night court.
