

KILLS WOMAN HE HAD PURSUED

CLEVELAND MAN COMES TO NEW YORK AND DOES MURDER.

Arrested. He Says He Meant Only to Wound His Former Partner's Wife, Who Had Spurned His Persistent Attention—His His Wife and Four Children in Ohio.

Mrs. Dora Stievel, 31 years old, the wife of Isador Stievel, a clothing cutter, of 82 Myrtle avenue, Brooklyn, was shot and instantly killed yesterday by Joseph Schulwitz of Cleveland, whose attentions she had repelled for several years. He was arrested.

Schulwitz, who is 35 years old, first met the woman when she and her husband and their two children, Julius and Esther, now 9 and 7 years old, lived in Boston. Schulwitz and Stievel went into a partnership meat business and while so engaged Schulwitz began to pay attention to his partner's wife. Mrs. Stievel did not encourage the man and, becoming alarmed at his persistence, she told her husband, Isador, who dissolved the partnership and with his family went to Sandusky, Ohio. Schulwitz followed them to that town and tried to see Mrs. Stievel. He also wrote love letters to her, but she ignored them.

In order to get rid of the man the Stievels moved to Philadelphia, and they had been there only a few months when Schulwitz learned where they were and renewed his advances to Mrs. Stievel. It was then that the family moved to Brooklyn. Schulwitz went to Cleveland. Recently he found out where the Stievels were in Brooklyn and by following Stievel from his place of employment in Houston street to his home he learned where they lived. It was alleged that he resumed his love letter writing to Mrs. Stievel and held out inducements to her to leave her husband and marry him. Mrs. Stievel burned the letters.

Yesterday morning Schulwitz waited near the large apartment house in which the Stievels live until he saw Stievel going away. Then he found the janitor of the house and asked him where the Stievels lived. He was directed to the second floor rear. Mrs. Stievel and her two children were seated at the breakfast table and a neighbor Mrs. Mary Kassenbaum, was in the room. Schulwitz quietly opened the hall door and stepped into the kitchen to draw a .32 calibre revolver and without saying a word he began to shoot at Mrs. Stievel. Her back was turned to the man. The first bullet passed close to the head of Mrs. Kassenbaum and lodged in the wall. Schulwitz fired a second time and the bullet entered Mrs. Stievel's back on the left side and went through the heart. She fell dead.

The murderer ran from the house pursued by Mrs. Kassenbaum, who screamed for help. A large crowd followed Schulwitz along Myrtle avenue to Third street, where he threw away the revolver. Two young men, Alexander Goldstein of 217 Myrtle avenue and William A. Brennan, who lives at 254 Stockholm street, overtook Schulwitz and held him until policemen and a driver of the Venetian station appeared. Before they took charge of the murderer he had been roughly handled by the crowd. Ambulance surgeon Wood, who was summoned from the Cumberland Street Hospital, pronounced Mrs. Stievel dead.

Schulwitz was taken to the police station under a strong guard and when questioned by Capt. Hughes he simply said that Mrs. Stievel had runned his life and that he did not intend to kill her. He added that he had a wife and four children in Cleveland, but that he loved Mrs. Stievel and had frequently sent money to her. Schulwitz was taken later to the Manhattan avenue police court, where he said that he meant only to wound Mrs. Stievel in the leg or arm. The court attendants said the man acted "queer." He was committed by Magistrate O'Reilly to await the action of the coroner.

CAPTAIN'S TABLE ABOLISHED.

Little Tables to Replace Long Ones on North German Lloyd Boats. The captain's table, which has been an institution aboard Atlantic liners, will be abolished by the North German Lloyd line after January 1. The success of the small tables, seating from two to seven persons, has inspired the line to do away altogether with the long tables, not always conducive to harmony among the diners. A party of financiers returning from Europe will be able to discuss market conditions without intruding their views on persons not interested in the subject, a newly married pair may utter soft sentiments without fear of being overheard, and families may dine together as if they were at home. Some of the democracy of dining will vanish, but the personal comforts will be increased. The first ship of the North German Lloyd line to adopt the new table is the Kaiser Kronprinzessin Cecilie, whose passengers approved the innovation. The Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, undergoing repairs at Bremen, will be fitted with small tables. If a large party of passengers want to dine together the tables will be so arranged as to accommodate them.

CHICAGO TRACTION PROBLEMS.

Belmont, Shonts and Hedley Are There Looking Them Over. CHICAGO, Nov. 9.—Theodore P. Shonts, August Belmont and Frank R. Hedley, general manager of the Interborough company of New York, came here to-day and there were rumors of a consolidation of elevated and surface lines and new subway enterprises. The three New Yorkers had conferences with Chicago street car, elevated and steam road officials and bankers. Financial men said that the merger of the surface and elevated roads and the development of subway transportation were to be worked out by Mr. Shonts, Mr. Belmont to direct the operations. Mr. Belmont is on his way to Cincinnati and is going with him, said Mr. Shonts. "Mr. Hedley is going to St. Louis on Monday night. We came by way of Chicago, as it was almost as convenient as going to Cincinnati direct. We have transacted some business while here, but I will not discuss it. We looked into the surface and elevated railroad problems in Chicago. I will not talk," said Mr. Belmont. "Mr. Shonts may explain what he sees fit."

BOGUS PATIENTS HALL.

"Waiting" stranger disappears with Dr. Clinton Willis' Jewels. The Brooklyn police are hunting for a man about 35 years old and 5 feet 10 inches in height, with dark complexion and hair, who carried off jewelry valued at more than \$1,000 from the home of Dr. Clinton Willis at 249 Jefferson avenue on Friday afternoon. The robber called at the house in the doctor's absence and at the suggestion of the servant took a seat in the office and his return, which was momentarily expected. He disappeared within fifteen minutes after ransacking Dr. Willis' room on the third floor and obtaining the jewels, some of which were highly prized for their family associations. One of the articles stolen was an antique gold lined snuffbox, which belonged to the Willis family nearly 150 years.
