

DIRECT NOMINATIONS BILL

IT'S PERMISSIVE AND PROVIDES FOR AN OFFICIAL BALLOT.

Hills Reported Appropriating \$230,000 to Begin the Construction of Buildings on State Fair Grounds—School Census Measure for This City and Buffalo.

ALBANY, Feb. 21.—Senator Travis and Assemblyman Green (Rep., Brooklyn) today introduced the direct nominations primary bill favored by Gov. Hughes and recommended in his annual message to the Legislature. The bill is again permissive in form. It is believed by some that this year the bill will pass in order to appease the Governor for his failure to get the Massachusetts ballot law that he so urgently advocated.

The bill provides that the general committee of a party in a city or village or in a county wholly within a city or in a borough of a city may adopt a rule for direct nominations. In order that the rule may be effective it must be adopted at least fifty days before the primary election. A copy of the rule must immediately be delivered to the custodian of primary records, who shall cause it to be published forthwith in a newspaper with a general circulation in the city or village and of the political faith of the party adopting the rule. The effect is that all the officers to be elected from territory wholly within the political subdivision must be nominated by direct vote at the primaries.

Provision is made under this bill for an official primary ballot containing the names of all the candidates for party nominations, as well as those for party positions. The candidates must be nominated by petition, the signatures of which must be acknowledged or proved. The signers must be enrolled members of the party, and no one may sign more than one petition. A petition presenting the name of a candidate for a position to be filled from an Assembly or Aldermanic district must be signed by at least 100; if from a Senatorial or Congressional district by at least 200; from a county by at least 500. In an election district by at least ten and from any other unit of representation by at least one percent of the vote cast in that territory for the party's candidate for Governor at the last gubernatorial election. The petition must be accompanied by the consent of the candidate in writing. It must be filed before 5 P. M. on the twentieth day before the primary election.

Vacancies due to the death of a candidate are to be filled by a committee named in the petition, subject to protest by the custodian of primary records or by an enrolled member of the party, and review by the Supreme Court or any Justice of that court. A voter may cast his ballot for any person whose name does not appear on the official primary ballot by writing in the proper place the name of the candidate of his choice.

Sample ballots are to be provided for such enrolled voters of the party as apply for them. The polls are to be open from 2 P. M. to 9 P. M. Proper provision is made for watchers and for the custody and canvassing of the vote and the determination of the result by the custodian of primary records. The expenses of conducting a primary election are to be paid out of the treasury of the city, village, county or borough where the election is held.

The series of State fair bills was reported today by the Senate Finance Committee, which in effect officially indorses the comprehensive plan for the extension of the State fair at Syracuse as an expenditure which will result in a net gain to the State.

The bill provides an appropriation of \$220,000 to begin the construction of the series of buildings, the first appropriation to be made to construct the main or liberal arts building. It also is provided that the State fair shall be governed by a commission of seven, comprising the Lieutenant-Governor and the State Agricultural Commissioner and five paid commissioners to be appointed by the Governor for a term of three years at a salary of \$3,000.

According to a bill introduced today by Senator Woodruff, the Mayor, Superintendent of Schools and Police Commissioner in New York and Buffalo are empowered to act as a committee to see that the police take a proper interest in the children between the ages of 4 and 18 years. Parents, according to the bill, are required to furnish information desired concerning children between those ages.

The foregoing provisions apply only to New York city and Buffalo. In other cities such school census boards may be established, and where they are not the school authorities shall take the census.

Senator Grady also introduced seven bills carrying out State Comptroller Glynn's recommendations to safeguard court and fund assets.

Assemblyman Eagleton introduced a bill to-day which gives the New York city Board of Health authority to control the proper ventilation of the New York city subway. The Board of Health is empowered to prescribe rules, and a penalty of \$250 a day is provided for non-compliance with the orders of the board is provided for in the bill.

The promoters of the New York-Canada Pacific Railroad to a road that has franchise to build a steam railroad from Schenectady to Canada parallel to the tracks of the New York Central, for two years have been endeavoring to get the time in which they must begin operations extended, but have failed at the past two sessions. To-day Assemblyman Frisbie of Schenectady introduced a bill authorizing the road to use electricity as well as steam, and extending the life of the franchise until July 1, 1919, at which time the road is to be completed.

13 SENATORS GO TO KILL KARE.

Guests Over Sunday at Tim Woodruff's Camp in the Adirondacks.

ALBANY, Feb. 21.—State Chairman Timothy L. Woodruff will entertain thirteen Republican Senators at Camp Kill Kare in the Adirondacks over Sunday. He invited all of the Republican Senators to spend the week-end at camp, but all could not go.

In view of the fact that Albany is to be taken on Wednesday this week-end a trip is considered in legislative circles to be significant. The following Senators comprised the party that left Albany to-day: Raymond C. Cobb, Allice Carpenter, Burr, Gates, Cordia, Hooker, Glosch, Gratian, Travis and Franchot.

Cause of Vassar's Anxiety Removed.

ALBANY, Feb. 21.—Vassar College is not to be bothered with further legislative effort to reestablish the Randall's Island House of Refuge a few miles below Poughkeepsie. Senator Armstrong, the chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, announced to-day that no further effort would be made to get legislative approval for the Dutchess county site.

MISS HESS MUST GO.

The Injunction She Got Restraining Hotel Manager is Dissolved.

The injunction obtained at Special Term by Virginia D. Hess, a public stenographer in the Murray Hill Hotel, restraining Levi P. Roberts, manager of the hotel, from interfering with her possession of the stenographer's office in the hotel, was dissolved yesterday by the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, which holds that Miss Hess has no valid lease or other title to the use of the office except in the pleasure of the management.

Miss Hess paid \$200 a month for the exclusive stenographic privilege in the hotel, conditional on her agreeing to the management. Roberts decided that her work was not satisfactory and tried to eject her, but she claimed to have a year's lease and refused to leave.

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
