MR. FLATWELLER'S VIEWS On Whether It Is Better to Kick for What You Want or to Kick for What You Don't Want.

"It is a most question," said Mr. Flatdweller, "whether you get more by kicking hard and constantly or by keeping quiet and making no complaints. In fact this question is like that of the tariff; economists who say we will do best with protection, and equally able and intelligent men who say we would do best with free trade, are more likely to get what they want by kicking and there are those who say you do better by going easy, and really it is a hard question to settle."

"Now, I don't lay claim to any special intelligence, but I have found by experience that in flat houses I get the best results by going easy, and I have adopted for my guidance one fixed rule: When I move into a house I never make a complaint or bother for at least six months."

"I find that it is wise to let other people make the complaints, as somebody is sure to do with the result, and, of getting the things that I might have complained of rectified without my having incurred the enmity or hard feeling of the janitor. If these benefits are realized, it is a rough complaint of the kickers who are all so much ahead and meanwhile my standing with the janitor is all the while improving. The others kick, I don't."

"I don't do it like the kickers who put him to trouble; he inclines naturally toward me, a tenant who gives him no trouble at all; he comes to think of me as a sane and reasonable man, and in consideration, and really the janitor's job is not the easiest one in the world, with a household of people constantly making him for or mending."

"And there's the whole philosophy of the thing. I establish with the janitor a reputation for being a reasonable man and our relations are pleasant, and then when I really want anything I go to him calmly and pleasantly and get it."

"This is my invariable rule, to make no complaint for at least six months, and I find that it is a hard question to settle, and I don't suppose it ever will be settled finally and definitely."

"How individuals settle it depends on their temperament. Some believe in kicking and some believe in going easy. I find that going easy, on the start at least, gets the best results, which is only another way of saying that it is easier to reasonableness with due consideration always pays."

SPEAKING ABOUT BARRELS

AN ORATION SPOKEN BETWEEN NAPS BY MR. COOPER.

No Encyclopedia Names the Inventor of Barrels, but What Would the World Be Without Them?—They Have Enriched the English Tongue—Barrel Facts.

One word had led to another until the talk had come around to the subject of barrels. Thereupon Mr. Cooper, who had been an uninterested listener, set up and began to take notice. When he was sufficiently awake to get a fair start nobody else could put in a word, and what he said ran somewhat as follows, as nearly as can be reported from memory:

"Strictly speaking a barrel is a quantity and not a utensil. There are various barrels, comprising various gallons. Therefore the quantitative barrel is not described by setting forth the number of gallons it contains, unless the gallon is defined. For example, a gallon of wine consists of eight pints, whereas a pint of beer is about a gallon and a half."

"This may seem paradoxical. Retailers of beer in pint cansavor that it is. "None of the encyclopedias, almanacs or compilations of 10,000 facts worth knowing tells when or by whom the barrel was invented. Diogenes (B. C. 412-323) one time resided in a tub. A tub is half a barrel. If half a barrel was invented before the time of Diogenes it is fair to presume that the other half was invented not later than midway between the time when the cynic philosopher left his school's hall in a tub and the present time of flats, say a little short of twenty-three centuries ago."

"It is worthy of mention that he spent an independent, if not a luxurious period in his tub, an apartment considerably smaller than a modern flat and not supplied with steam heat, hot water, electric lights, telephone and a resident janitor. There is evidence that Diogenes preferred a sun bath to that furnished by the hot water service of a flat. ARMY BALLOON STATION. Aerial Headquarters at Omaha Will Cost \$1,000,000. Some time this month work will begin on a new army station for the development and trial of war balloons at Fort Omaha. The Government is spending \$1,000,000 upon the work, and the headquarters of the aerial department of the United States army will be established there.

A steel house for the storage of the balloons when not in use has just been completed at a cost of \$100,000, says Harper's Weekly. It is entirely of steel, and is indestructible. The building is 200 feet long, 70 feet wide, and 75 feet high. It weighs three hundred tons, and is one of the features of this house is the size of the doors. These are seventy five feet high and weigh fourteen tons apiece, yet they will slide open or shut by the pressure of a hand upon a lever. There are 120,000 iron rivets in the building.

At the back of the balloon house is a building in which the hydrogen gas will be manufactured. Col. W. A. Glassford, who is in command at Fort Omaha, spent a year recently investigating the balloon department of the French, English, German, and Italian war departments. A series of experiments with balloons and aeroplanes will be begun under his direction.

"And—this bears on the question of the antiquity of the barrel—a maker of hats is a hatter; then why isn't the maker of coops a cooper? Evidently because barrels were made before coops and the barrel maker got the name first. "The barrel figures in Orphic poetry: "Niddy niddy. "Two heads and one body. "Thus wrote a poet long before the days of museum freaks and press agents. It could have meant nothing else than a barrel."

THE REFORMED BRONCO. May Be Seen Any Day in the Bridle Paths of Central Park. To the general public the word bronco suggests everything wild and vicious in horsemanship. One associates the usefulness of the bronco almost entirely with the rugged West. That this wiry little animal could ever develop the points of a good park horse would be received with much reservation by most persons.

Yet some ten years or more of cross-breeding, says Country Life in America, has accomplished this somewhat amazing result. To lay one eye on the bridle paths of Central Park the well-groomed bronco fraternizing with an equal with the Blue Grass thoroughbred, and his number is constantly growing.

To be sure, he is no longer the hammer-headed with pronounced ewe neck, almost as devoid of flesh as a skeleton. He has developed a fine crest in his uprearing and can show as fine a neck as any Kentucky bred horse.
