

JEW TO GET UP ON BINGHAM

NOW THEY COMMEND HIM FOR HIS MAGNANIMITY.

Change over the "Federation Review" to Withdraw Attacks and Make It a Bingham Number—Plan to Form His Brother Society Themselves.

The Federation of Jewish Organizations, as one result of the statement by Police Commissioner Bingham in a magazine article that the Jewish population furnishes 30 per cent of the criminals...

Mr. Bingham was officially commended yesterday not only on behalf of the federation but of the National Liberal Immigration League for his frank admission that he had no statistics to support his statement.

It was interesting to note the retraction of Mr. Bingham came in the nick of time. The coming number of the Federation Review, the official organ of the federation and the league, which will go out to-morrow, was expected largely of articles and interviews denouncing him.

Statistics were in the meantime collected by Mark J. Katz, secretary of the league and the federation as to the amount of criminality among the Jewish population. Secretary Katz said yesterday that the proportion of criminality furnished by the Jews was 10.3 per cent.
