SELLS, GOULD INTERMEDIARY

SAYS HOWARD GOULD OFFERED TO LET HIS WIFE DIVORCE HIM

After She Rejected Terms He Proposed by Which She Would Retain Her Property and the Custody of Her Children...

Elijah Sells of Haskins & Sells, public accountants, was examined yesterday in the office of E. G. Whittaker, as referee, concerning his knowledge of the facts involved in the suit for a separation brought by Katherine Clemmons Gould against Howard Gould.

Mr. Sells testified that he had never observed any reprehensible conduct on the part of Mrs. Gould, had never seen her intoxicated and had never heard her use vulgar, coarse or abusive language. He had been intimately associated with the Goulds, even accompanying them on a long European trip as a guest on Howard Gould's yacht Niagara.

As to the relations between Mrs. Howard Gould and Dustin Farnum, the actor, Mr. Sells declared that Mrs. Gould had only operated as a business agent for Farnum after she had been assured that her husband would not live with her. She then decided, according to the testimony of the various witnesses, that she would lie in a return to the stage, so she consulted various people, with the result that Mr. Farnum was made almost a member of her social household...

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SERVIAN APPEAL TO RUSSIA

To Check Austria's Plans—Bulgaria and Turkey Agree.

BELGRADE, Oct. 29.—The president of the Serbian Skupstina sent to-day to the president of the Russian Duma a telegram declaring that the people of Serbia and Montenegro in the name of the people of Bosnia and Herzegovina have resolved to prevent the accomplishment of the annexation of the last named States by Austria.

He expressed the hope "that constitutional Russia will not consent to a repetition on the occasion of the 'old' service of Russian diplomacy regarding the Serbian people, but that with the aid and cooperation of Russia the just cause of Bosnia and Herzegovina and the whole Serbian nation may triumph."

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KAISER ANGERED GERMANY

HIS INTERVIEW WAS AROUSED A STORM OF PROTEST.

The Greatest Indecision of His Reign. One Paper Says—Did He Also Provide Japan With Plans Which Led to Victory, Russians Ask Contemptuously.

BERLIN, Oct. 29.—If the interview with the Kaiser, published by the London Telegraph, is received with capacious coolness in Great Britain, it is not too much to say that it has raised a storm of anger here. Germans have waited vainly for an official repudiation of the conversation, which at first it was not doubted would be forthcoming, and their disappointment at the non-appearance of such a repudiation is extreme.

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DATE OF ABRUZZI MARRIAGE

Not Yet Fixed—Departure of Naval Escort Depends Upon It.

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NEW FINDS AT POMPEII

Two Sepulchral Monuments Discovered—One Erected to a Woman.

ROME, Oct. 29.—The excavations at Pompeii have led to the discovery of two sepulchral monuments, the first belonging to the Edile Vestorius Priscus, which is decorated with frescoes, and the second to a woman named Septimia. The latter has a marble inscribed tablet intact and contains a semi-circular relief around a column surmounted by a sun dial, which is identified as an exact reproduction of the mosaic picture (so-called of philosophers lately discovered at the same spot.
