MAKERS COMPLETING FORMATION OF CONTEST ASSOCIATION.

Meeting Set to Be Held to Finalize Organization Details—Committee Finishes Rules for Cobe Trophy—Annual A. A. Tour to Start From Detroit.

Announcement was made yesterday that a meeting is soon to be called for the purpose of completing the organization of the Manufacturers Contest Association, which will sponsor the annual Cobe trophy automobile show in that city. Manufacturers and importers who have produced or imported fifty cars of any one make are eligible as members of the association, which has formed an alliance with the American Automobile Association and will cooperate with that body in the governing of all national speed and endurance contests in this country.

The rules committee of the association, which was appointed at Chicago, is made up of the following: Chairman, Detroit, Mich.: A. Riker, Locomobile; Frank B. Stearns, Stearns; Paul Lacroix, Renault; Edgar Apperson, Apperson, and G. A. Wedley, Premier. The members of this committee have prepared rules and conditions for a stripped stock chassis race to be held in Indiana for the Cobe trophy and have submitted these rules to the contest board of the American Automobile Association for approval.

The advisory committee of the Manufacturers Contest Association, consisting of Alfred Reeves of the American Motor Car Manufacturers Association; E. Rand of the American Automobile Salon; E. E. C. of the American Automobile Manufacturers Association; which was appointed to confer with the A. A. A. contest board regarding sanctions and rules for contests, has had frequent meetings with Chairman Hower and his associates. The cars whose names are listed as being represented in the association include the following: Apperson, Buick, Chalmers-Detroit, Chadwick, Fiat, Ford, Isotta, Italia, Knox, Lozier, Locomobile, Maxwell, Mitchell, Napier, Peerless, Premier, Pennylite, Packard, Packard, Reo, Renault, Stearns, Thomas and White.
