

ST. YVES ONCE MORE A WINNER

FRENCHMAN EASILY FIRST IN MARATHON RUN

Field of 13 Runners for Professional Race Before 15,000 Persons at the Polo Grounds—Svanberg of Sweden Second—Crook From Fall River Third.

Henri St. Yves, the Frenchman, with the same remarkable speed and stamina which enabled him to win the Derby here several weeks ago, scored an easy victory in the 10,000 Marathon race at the Polo Grounds yesterday afternoon.

John Marsh, who won the Canadian Derby last Saturday, finished seventh in spite of the fact that he ran nearly twenty miles with a severe cramp in his right leg.

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DAWBARN FAST IN YALE MEET.

Princeton Sprinter Wins in Fine Time—Yale Outscours the Tigers.

PRINCETON, May 8.—Yale and Princeton contested here in track athletics this afternoon. Yale won by a score of 58 to 46, but this total does not tell the whole story.

The Tigers revealed magnificent form in the track events, altogether surprising the spectators. On the other hand Yale had everything her own way on the field.

At the sprints and distance runs Princeton beat the Elis by 45 points to 19, the places counting here. Two days ago, however, the time the pole vault was begun it looked as though the Orange and Black would win, but Yale proved remarkably strong here and more than made up for the lead.

In the field events Yale got 30 points, Princeton, 12. The meet was lost to the Tigers because they had no weight men or jumpers.

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RAINEB'S BRONX MARATHON

EASY VICTORY FOR FORMER XAVIER A. A. LAD.

Fast Performance Too Over a Difficult Course—Sammy Mellor in the Money Once More—Special Leaps 6 Feet 4 Inches in Final Event; Near Record.

The Bronx Marathon, held yesterday under the auspices of the Northwestern A. C., was won by A. Raines, formerly of the Xavier A. A., now running unattached.

He won by a mile and a half from his nearest opponent, and covered the trying hill, dusty course in 2 hours 46 minutes, 53 seconds. The performance must rank as one of the best in the amateur class.

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Raines, who won the Tremont avenue race last winter and has been prominent in other events afterward, was examined by a doctor before he started. He was informed that his condition was such that he would be likely to collapse any moment after five miles, yet he finished fresher than any other man in the race.

After the men started out along the road there was a bit of a change and at 14th street the pace was changed to a mile a mile mark, Fitzgibbon of the Irish A. C. was in the lead with Miller of the Mercury.

NAVY TRACK MEN WIN TOO.

Columbia Athletics Beaten—Carey Turns Loose Some Great Sprinting.

ANNAPOLIS, May 8.—The Naval Academy won from Columbia this afternoon in a field and track meet by 64 to 53. The Navy victory was largely due to the work of its great sprinter, Carey, who took the 100, 200 and 400 yard runs. He did 9.4 seconds in the 100, which equals his own record, and 21.3 seconds in the 200, which is two-fifths of a second better than he did before in his own record.

The best work of the visitors was in the pole vault, in which H. S. Babcock and T. S. Babcock were tied for 10 feet 10 inches, which is an inch higher than the Naval Academy record. The summary: 100 Yard Run—Won by Carey, Navy, 9.4 seconds; second, Columbia, 10.2 seconds; third, Babcock, Navy, 10.5 seconds.
