CUBS STOP THE GIANTS' RUSH

SCORE 9 TO 0 IN FINAL GAME AT CHICAGO.

New Yorkers Only Get Four Hits On Brown—Brooklyn and St. Louis Divide Honors in a Double Header—Cincinnati Takes Two Games From Boston.

CHICAGO, Aug. 15.—The onrush of the Giants was halted by the Cubs this afternoon, the champions winning the last game of the series by a score of 9 to 0. The game was one sided as the sports indicators and the Cubs have what satisfaction there is in taking one game out of five and at the same time blanking the New Yorks.

In whitewashing honors were even on the series, so the only bait for the Cubs in addition to winning the double header was that they won in hollow style.

Mordcael Brown held the whip hand to-day, reviving after his setback of last Thursday and subjugating the Giants as thoroughly as he has often done before. The Giants never could get their heads against him. He wouldn't allow them to even start a hitting bee. Four Giants reached first base through the medium of as many sparse singles, and of this number one invaded the enemy's works as far as second base, while not one reached third base.

Another night of rain was followed by another torrid day, out on the field the sun drew the dampness out of the ground, adding to the burdens of the athletes by creating a steamy atmosphere in which to wage war. The home warriors showed much more energy in the Turkish bath environment than the visitors. It is believed, however, that Brown had as much to do with the result as did the pitcher.

Crandall, too, was a factor. With him hitting for New York the Cubs played the hit convention, first leading through weakness. That wasn't according to Hoyle, but it was good hitting according to the chances count. In the fourth inning, when the Cubs bunched hits on Crandall after an error had put a runner on base. 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AMONG THE AUTOMOBILISTS

DE PALMA PRAISES SUFFOLK COUNTY CIRCUIT.

Stamess Racing Driver Says Riverhead Mattuck Course Will Permit Big Stock Cars to Average More Than Sixty Miles an Hour—Road Tests.

Ralph De Palma, the racing driver who made two of the fastest rounds of the circuit in the Automobile Club of America's Grand Prize gold cup road race at Savannah, Ga., last fall, and the holder of the one mile and other records for one mile tracks, declares the circuit in Suffolk county, Long Island, over which the stock car sweepstakes are to be run on September 21, is one of the finest courses he has ever seen.

The run from New York to Riverhead, over the South road, showed that the Long Island roads, so far as the south side of the island is concerned, are in fine condition and are well fitted for the greater part of the distance. About eight miles of the circuit over which the cars will race has already been oiled, this being a stretch from Riverhead nearly as far as Mattituck.

The distances on the circuit, starting from Riverhead, are as follows: Aqueogue, 3 miles; Jansport, 5 1/2 miles; Laurel, 7 miles; Mattituck, 10 1/2 miles; West, 12 miles; Northville, 16 miles; Centreville, 19 miles, and the starting and finishing line at Riverhead, 22 miles.

The circuit runs in practically a straight line from Riverhead to Mattituck, with the exception of one turn two miles from Riverhead, so that there are two ten mile straights without a turn, and only three turns on each round of the circuit.

De Palma declares that one of the turns on the Suffolk county circuit is the best when compared to the turns that drivers have been forced to round in other road races. He says the roads are the widest and safest he had ever seen in a race circuit, and predicts that the big cars will complete the race distance at an average speed of better than sixty miles an hour.

The tests of the effects of automobile tire surfaces of different kinds on road surfaces which were made by the Automobile Club of America, and held recently under the supervision of James Owen, County Engineer of Essex county, and the Associated Automobile Clubs of New Jersey will be postponed on account of the weather.

It is now planned to have the tests on August 23, the day of this week, but the location of the stretches to be used will not be made public until after the completion of the experiments.

Automobilists who visited the Brighton Beach Motordrome yesterday found the alterations and improvements of the one mile track in the grandstand, and the building of the turn is progressing rapidly and the changes in the contour of the track will be completed in about ten days.
