

THEY'D SHUT OFF THE DRINK

PLAN OF THE LIQUOR MEN TO CLOSE DISORDERLY PLACES.

After Sunday Laws and Restriction of Licenses Also Urged by the State Association—The Clergymen to Help Them Out With a Legislative Bill.

The New York State Liquor Dealers Association, in convention at the Lexington Opera House, passed some important resolutions yesterday.

The dealers want a bill providing for more liberal Sunday laws introduced into the Legislature; they want licenses restricted to one for every 750 persons instead of one for every 400 as at present.

They want to have the Federal Government prohibit the sale of internal revenue tax certificates to dealers not holding liquor tax certificates under the laws of New York.

In pushing the bill which it has in mind the association has the promise of active assistance from several clergymen, among them the Rev. Dr. John P. Peters, pastor of St. Michael's Episcopal Church, who promises the cooperation of the committee of fourteen; Dr. Slosser, and the Rev. W. A. Wasson of Liverpool, N. Y., who addressed the association on Monday in behalf of temperance as against prohibition.

In another resolution the association determined to help to stamp out disorderly resorts by refusing to supply them with liquor. The resolution says: While the owners of such resorts are denied membership in the association and the association recognizes that their existence is wholly due to the deficiencies in the law, we insist that they are the basis of the active agitation against (legitimate) traffic and urge that those furnishing them with supplies be called upon to discontinue such services, which would have the effect of closing them up immediately.

Souvenirs were scattered among the 500 delegates present consisting of facilities of the liquor license granted to William F. Berry and Abraham Lincoln in 1833 permitting them to sell liquor in Sangamon county, Illinois. According to the prices quoted in the license apple brandy and whiskey were to cost a half pint in those days. These souvenirs were offered as evidence that Lincoln believed in temperance but by no means in prohibition.

Miss Ethel H. Stewart, president of the Women's Municipal Ownership League of Greater New York, called yesterday afternoon at the office of the association in cooperation of the association in the movement for municipal ownership and woman suffrage. The officers protested their being asked to do so, but she insisted as such and offered little assistance.

President M. F. Farley and the other officers were re-elected, except that John Mortenson of Syracuse was elected secretary, was succeeded by Florence Donovan of Kings county. A new office of "guard" was created and given to Herman Hahn of White Plains.

KILLED BY RACING AUTO. Man Out Early to Watch Practice Hit in a Fog. LOWELL, Mass., Aug. 31.—In a fog that covered the Merrimack Valley automobile racing circuit early this morning just as the drivers of racing cars were going out for practice Henry Otis, a well known operative of this city, was fatally injured by a racing car driven by Joseph Matson.

Otis with several companions went to the course to watch the practice, and was walking along Fowler road, which connects the State road with Varnum road and on which is Matson's racing quarters, when he heard a car approaching. The fog was so thick that he could not see the car and apparently confused he stood in the middle of the road. An instant later, according to friends, a racing car came out of the fog and before the driver could see Otis he was struck. Otis was rushed to a hospital, where it was found that he had a compound fracture of the skull and other injuries. He died soon after his arrival. Otis was only 20 years of age. Matson was not running at high speed, having just left the garage for the course, and he was not considered responsible for the accident.

NINE RIBS SAWED OUT. Delicate Operation Resorted to to Save Would-be Suicide. PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 31.—A rare and delicate operation was successfully performed at the West Philadelphia Homoeopathic Hospital today by two of the staff physicians.

In an effort to save the life of Clifford J. Russell, whose lung had been punctured by a self-inflicted shot, nine of his ribs were removed. Russell was brought to the hospital last Friday night, having attempted suicide by shooting himself with a shotgun. The discharge of the gun shattered three of his ribs, leaving a gap in the chest. The air rushed in, filling the pleura and collapsing the left lung.

When nine ribs had been removed the wall of the chest cavity was closed, and by obliterating the cavity caused by the collapsed lung. Russell responded to the operation nicely, and today while still in a critical condition was resting well.

JIMINEZ WINS BY BLOODSHED.

Desperate Fighting Reported in Costa Rica Election—A Zelaya Victory. WASHINGTON, Aug. 31.—The American Minister to Costa Rica has reported to the State Department that Gen. Jiminez has been successful in the Costa Rica Presidential elections.

The elections were quiet and orderly. The present President is Cleto Gonzalez Viquez. His term ends in May, 1910. NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 31.—Private despatches received in New Orleans from Port Lima, Costa Rica, to-day tell of fighting between the supporters of Ricardo Jiminez and Rafael Iglesias, Presidential candidates, with private converted the election into the bloodiest civil war ever known in the republic.

Coupled with the fighting was the capture of a filibustering expedition near the Nicaraguan border, which President Zelaya of Nicaragua is accused of directing in an effort to seat Jiminez in Costa Rica's Presidential chair. Zelaya's interference in Costa Rica's election is part of his plan to consolidate all Central American republics under one head, and it complicates the situation alarmingly.

Fighting has been going on in San José, the capital, and in Port Limon for two days. The election began on Aug. 9 and is supposed to conclude to-day. On the day before the election the guards at Casa Blanca discovered in a cave near the Nicaraguan frontier a ship loaded with 300 rifles and thousands of rounds of ammunition. This expedition was captured and Government officials assert it was directed by Zelaya.

This was the signal for Jiminez, Zelaya's Costa Rica henchman and Republican Presidential candidate, to act. He mobilized 4,000 men in the streets of San José and issued an edict that his opponent, Iglesias, planned to count him out of the election.

The opponents of Jiminez then donned war paint, and a score of clashes between the rival forces have occurred since Sunday. There have been many fatalities and stores have been turned into hospitals. A clash in San José at the entrance to the Reventazon Bridge, in which a score of fighters were thrown into the stream and drowned. Jiminez, the despatches read, is sure to be elected. This paves the way for Zelaya's scheme to consolidate all the Central American republics, with himself as chief.

MEXICAN SHOTS MEXICAN. Mexican Had Fired Several Times at Matkilejoh, Mining Man. MEXICO CITY, Mexico, Aug. 31.—A despatch from Guanajuato says that Robert MacCormack, British Vice-Consul at that place, and D. F. Matkilejoh, Jr., an American mining man, were riding along a road near Las Playas, when they were fired upon by a Mexican. Matkilejoh was fired upon at Austin that he was here and would surrender. He says he sent a despatch to Austin immediately after landing at the Quarantine station, late last night, but this afternoon the sheriff showed up in a tug and he surrendered to him.
