FIERY END TO HUDSON SHOW

BEACONS LIGHT THE BAY AND 150 MILES OF RIVER.

The Tired City Not So Keen for the Spectacle as the Up-Country Towns—Mist Interferes With Skyscraper View—Battery Gets the Best of It.

It was a fond farewell to all their greatness that the Hudson-Fulton commission sounded last evening, a lingering one night and good-by, in their own words, when the chain of signal fires was set alight at the foot of the Narrows at 9 o'clock.

Whatever may have been the case further up stream, down here the people had had so much of the Hudson-Fulton celebration that there was a comparatively small crowd on to see the final farsep, notwithstanding the romantic and picturesque possibilities suggested by this line of signal fires 150 miles long.

At 9 o'clock the signal fires spoke from Fort Hamilton, on Long Island, from Fort Wadsworth, on the Staten Island shore, from Fort Columbus on Governors Island, from Fort Wood on Bedloe's Island, where the ancients used to eat oysters from the neighboring waters, and thence at intervals all the way up the Hudson river to Albany.

The great battery of searchlights near 155th street, which turned its full force into a single ray of white light directed toward the south, was unable to make sufficient impression upon the thick air so that the people downtown, even in the Singer tower, could know that it was doing business.

STROBEL ON TRIAL.

Republican State Committeeman Accused of Larceny of State and County Funds.

GUNS BID INFLEXIBLE ADIEU

BRITAIN'S SWIFT SEA FIGHTER OFF TO ENGLAND.
