

SENATOR GORE ON THE BLIND

SIGHTLESS HIMSELF, HE TALKS OF THEIR TRAINING.

Opposes Their Being Brought Up in Institutions—His First Experience With a Typewriter for the Blind Adds Checkers to His Knowledge of Games.

Thomas P. Gore, the blind Senator from Oklahoma, was guest at a reception given by Miss Winifred Holt at the New York Association for the Blind, 118 East Fifty-ninth street, yesterday afternoon.

Although Senator Gore has been totally blind since he was 11 years old, he doesn't make a practice of visiting institutions and much of the work was new to him.

In discussing institutions for the blind Senator Gore said: "It is cruel to isolate unsighted children and rob them of their individuality and self-reliance."

At the age of 8 Senator Gore lost the sight of one eye, and at 11 he was totally blind. His father proposed that he be educated in an institution for the blind.

Senator Gore was delighted to learn that three of the public schools of New York had admitted blind children.

THE TARIFF ALL TO BLAME.

Oklahoma Senator Says That's the Cause of High Prices.

Senator Gore of Oklahoma explained to the League for Political Education at the Hudson Theatre yesterday his theory of the cause of the present high prices of commodities.

His women hearers were obviously delighted when they heard that high prices couldn't possibly have anything to do with gold, because since there was a uniform gold standard throughout the civilized world gold fluctuations could affect English prices and American prices in the same ratio.

"I differ from those who believe that a high tax is a blessing," went on the Senator. "I believe that all taxes are a burden, and I don't think that it is possible to increase a man's prosperity by adding to his burdens."

"Here we are spending millions every year digging canals and deepening harbors in order to facilitate trade," he continued, "and then we build up a high wall of tariff to obstruct it."

As Robert Erskine Lily led the speaker to a chair after he had thanked the audience for their "very respectful attention," many of the women who had been drinking in his words started perceptibly.
