

VICTORY FOR RED AND BLUE

PENNSYLVANIA WINS THE RELAY CHAMPIONSHIPS

Franklin Field a Big Success Twenty Thousand Cheer the Home Teams to Victory—Manual Training Takes High School Championship.

PHILADELPHIA, April 30.—Pennsylvania won with a surprising array of athletic events in its own relay carnival here today. It won three championships. The event being by a greater margin than the two miles, and four mile by considerably more than the preceding two.

There was the biggest relay meet that has been held on Franklin Field. There were some 2,000 persons in the stands and 10,000 more in the vicinity to witness the celebration of the occasion. It was the first time the Red and Blue has taken three relay championships. Yale won all in 1909, but no other university has done so.

Taylor, the two mile record holder, was the only one to win for the last time. He showed how much Cornell had to do to win the race, because Taylor's withdrawal killed all chances in the four mile. Herbert Church had the task of running the fourth instalment for Penn.

They turned into the stretch together, but Church got away inch by inch until he hit the tape three yards to the goal. The race in 8 minutes 23.5 seconds, just one-fifth of a second behind the collegiate record for this event.

There was a great field for the one mile championship. Added to Pennsylvania, Michigan, Chicago, Virginia, Illinois, Cornell, Dartmouth and Princeton was M. T. which started because of a default in Class A, which left the Tech men without a race.

Though of Pennsylvania had the pole in the first relay and he scuttled to the front during the turn in the second. He led and he led and he led in front by the least margin. The time of this quarter was 4 minutes 33.5 seconds. It was all through the others tried to have a run. Texas Ransdell took up a two yard lead. He was Penn's last man, pulled against Harvard's Cornell and Rohrer of Illinois.
