A. E. THOMAS'S "HER HUSBAND'S WIFE" SUCCEEDS.

Henry Miller and Laura Hope Crews in a Good Company at the Garrick—A Hypochondriac Wife is Cured of Her Ills as Jealousy of Her Own Making.

New dramatist was introduced to the New York public last night in A. E. Thomas, whose play "Her Husband's Wife" was acted by Henry Miller and his company at the Garrick Theatre.

Mr. Thomas chose to present himself as the author of a comedy, ignoring the more serious play with a mission or at least a play with strong dramatic interest.

The author has every justification for calling his play a comedy in those days of loose classification, although his polite fan starts from a hypothesis so artificial as to be within the less probable realm of farce.

The "skeleton" of the action is of course amply covered in the play by such episodes as the husband's wife, the husband's rapid acquisition of a mistress in her successor, in the mistaken belief of this young woman's love for the man who is really engaged to somebody else.

The most successful character in "Her Husband's Wife" is the hypochondriac husband and she has been sketching with unflinching humor and fidelity to the type by Mr. Thomas.

After the close of the second act Mr. Miller, in response to continued applause, thanked the audience in the name of the author, whom he described as bashful, for himself and on behalf of the company.
