Situation in That State Interests the Colonel. His Name Will See Him in His Sanctum Today—Old Vox Populi Senses in Advance by Telegraph.

OYSTER BAY, L. I., July 25.—Whatever views Mr. Roosevelt has in regard to the possibility of confronting the Republicans of Ohio on the eve of the State convention at Columbus he is keeping to himself. Further than to reiterate his wish that a progressive platform be adopted in that State the ex-President refused to comment to-night. He was evidently surprised when he learned that Judge Reynolds Kinkade had withdrawn from the gubernatorial contest. While he expressed no opinion on the subject, he seemed pleased to hear a report that James R. Garfield has a chance to land the nomination.

THE FORT MONROE ACCIDENT

Due to Failure of the Safety Device of the Gun to Function Properly. WASHINGTON, July 25. The board of army officers which investigated the recent accident at Fort Monroe, Va., in which eleven enlisted men were killed by the blowing out of the breech block, has reported that the accident was due to the failure of the safety device to function properly. The board of officers, headed by Major John B. Hayden, Major William R. Smith and Capt. Harrison Hall, all officers of the Coast Artillery Corps stationed at Fort Monroe. The finding of the board, which was made public to-day at the War Department, was as follows: "That at battle command service practice on July 21, 1910, conducted by the student officers of the Coast Artillery school, the first loading of gun No. 1, (battery) Battery G. A. De Russy, failed to function properly in this instance, the breech block had commenced the primer was fired, causing a premature explosion of the powder charge which blew out the breech block, and resulted in the death of eleven men."

Gov. and Mrs. Hughes Start for Washington to Select a House.

ALBANY, July 25. Gov. and Mrs. Hughes, accompanied by Major Cross, military secretary to the Governor, left this afternoon for Washington, where it is understood the Governor and Mrs. Hughes are to pick out a home to be equipped when the Governor removes to Washington in October to take up his new duties as an Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Court. The Governor will return to Albany the latter part of the week.

Movements of Naval Vessels.

WASHINGTON, July 25. The battleship Michigan has arrived at New York, the cruiser Birmingham and Delaware at Newport, the yacht Sylph at Beverly, the battleship Vermont and the cruiser Yankton at Provincetown, the collier Hestor and Mars at Newport News, the collier Nanshan at Cavite, the hospital ship Solace at Hampton Roads, the cruiser Washington at the League Islands and the cruiser South Dakota at Cavite.

Justice Russell Retires from Republican County Committee.

Isaac Franklin Russell, who was recently appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Special Sessions by Mayor Gaynor, has resigned as a delegate from the Seventeenth Assembly district in Brooklyn. This is in compliance with the new law prohibiting judicial officers from active participation in party politics.

Army and Navy Orders.

WASHINGTON, July 25. These army orders were issued to-day: Capt. Edward T. Hartmann, Fifth Infantry, to fill vacancy in Quartermaster's Department; Capt. William D. Davis, Quartermaster, who is assigned to Fifth Infantry; Lieut. Colonel Charles H. Smith, to fill vacancy in Quartermaster's Department from August 24; Lieut. Colonel William H. Carter, General Staff, to duty as assistant to Chief of Staff.

KATZENBACH WOULD TAKE IT BUT LIKE DR. WOODROW WILSON HES A PASSIVE CANDIDATE.

Friends Thought He Was Too Passive and He Has Come Out With a Statement Dr. Wilson Unable to Meet Other Candidates at To-morrow's Rally. TRENTON, July 25.—After playing hide and seek with the Democratic nomination for Governor of New Jersey for months Frank S. Katzenbach, Jr., formerly Mayor of Trenton and Governor Fort's opponent three years ago, announced to-day that he would accept another nomination should it be tendered him. He said that for personal and other reasons he did not desire to be a candidate again, but being neither ungrateful nor inebriated to past honors he would respond to the call of his party. This is the way he defined his attitude: "If my position with respect to the Democratic nomination for Governor is not understood I will endeavor to make it clear as it is possible for me to do."

ORDINANCE WARRANTS IT AND ORDER IS TO BE ISSUED.

They Say the West Keeps the Big Eggs and Sends the Little Ones Here for Sale by the Dozen—Weight to Be Stamped on Leaves—What's a Glass of Beer? Eggs must hereafter be sold by weight, according to Commissioner Driscoll of the bureau of weights and measures. The order, which will be put into effect about August 1, is based on the ordinance recently passed by the Aldermen and signed by the Mayor requiring that all provisions shall be sold by weight. Mr. Driscoll has decided that provisions includes eggs, and he is supported in this idea by an opinion he received yesterday from the Corporation Council stating that eggs undoubtedly came within the scope of the ordinance.

REPUBLICANS GET BUSY.

Open Headquarters in Memphis, Tenn., for the First Time in 25 Years. MEMPHIS, Tenn., July 25.—Taking advantage of the break in the Democratic ranks in Tennessee and encouraged by the hostile attitude of many lifelong Democrats to the present administration headed by Gov. Malcolm R. Patterson, Democratic candidate for a third term, the Republicans have formally opened headquarters in Memphis for the first time in more than twenty-five years. Candidates in both county and State elections have been announced and a systematic canvass of the local situation is being made for the judicial election August 4, when new Supreme Court Judges and other officers will be chosen.

LIUT.-COL. PRINCE TO RETIRE.

He Was One of the Officers of the Marine Corps Who Were Reprimanded. WASHINGTON, July 25. Lieut.-Col. Thomas C. Prince, assistant quartermaster of the Marine Corps, has applied for voluntary retirement under the thirty year service law. Lieut.-Col. Prince was one of the Marine Corps officers recently reprimanded by acting Secretary of the Navy Winthrop as a result of the naval court of inquiry which investigated conditions at the headquarters of the corps in this city. He not only was reprimanded officially but was transferred from Washington to Manila for duty as quartermaster of the First Brigade of Marines there.

WANTS MORE WIRELESS BOOKS.

Federal Prosecutor Starts Contempt Proceedings Against United Wireless. Another case of missing account books came up in the Federal courts yesterday when the officers and directors of the United Wireless Telegraph Company, present the subject of a Federal Grand Jury investigation, were cited before Judge Hand in the United States Circuit Court for contempt because of their failure to produce eighteen stock transfer books and certain stock certificates. The company has produced ninety-nine books in all, but the court has ordered the Attorney General to prosecute.

REVOLT LEADER KILLED.

Honduras Rebels in Hard Luck So Far—Fillibusters on the Coast. WASHINGTON, July 25.—Fenton R. McCreery, American Minister to Honduras, reported to the State Department to-day that early on the morning of July 22 the revolutionists made an attack upon the barracks at Puerto Cortes. The attack, however, was repulsed, and Gen. Marin, the leader of the insurgents, was killed. Mr. McCreery also reported that the revolutionary movement at San Pedro Sula was suppressed, several persons being captured. Four vessels, he continued, are known to be off the coast of Honduras with a considerable number of men. The plans of the revolutionists, however, are known to President Davies.

PLAN FOR RAISING THE MAINE.

John F. O'Rourke of This City Submits It to the War Department. WASHINGTON, July 25.—John F. O'Rourke of New York, a contractor, laid before the officers of the War Department to-day a plan for raising the wreck of the battleship Maine from Havana harbor. He had a conference with Robert Shaw Oliver, acting Secretary of War, and Brig.-Gen. William H. Bixby, Chief of Engineers, to whom he explained the details of his method for raising the wreck. Many other plans for raising the Maine have been suggested to the army engineers, to whom the work was entrusted by Congress. No action will be taken on them pending an opinion by Attorney-General Wickham as to the construction of the recent act of Congress appropriating \$300,000 for raising the wreck.
