

MR. GAYNOR HIMSELF AGAIN

DOING ABOUT AS HE USED TO DO DOWN AT ST. JAMES.

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MORE CARS DYNAMITED.

Two Serious Explosions in Columbus Severely Injure Passengers.

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Aug. 30.—One of the most serious dynamite explosions since the street car strike began occurred at Main street and Grant avenue at 10 o'clock to-night.

A car containing several passengers was badly wrecked and three persons were injured.

By the time the police arrived the victims had been removed to physicians' offices and there was difficulty in getting their names or learning the extent of their injuries.

The injured women were removed from the scene in an automobile. Two other women were badly stunned but were able to walk away.

Although the trouble occurred in the heart of a densely populated section, it was not followed by demonstrations of any kind.

W. D. Mahon, international president, and C. O. Pratt, chairman of the Car-men's International Union, and a group of other labor leaders from Columbus and other Ohio cities to-day formally called upon General Manager Stewart of the Columbus Railway and Light Company to arbitrate the strike difficulty.

Stewart refused to arbitrate and the labor leaders then arranged for a conference to-night with Gov. Harmon.

SUICIDE LEAVES QUEER NOTE

SAMUEL J. HIRSH CUTS THROAT AT KNICKERBOCKER.

Chicago Clothing Manufacturer Had Just Returned From Trip to Europe for Nervousness Friends Don't Understand His Attention to a Woman.

Samuel J. Hirsh of the firm of Hirsh, Wolkwitz & Co., clothing manufacturers in Chicago, committed suicide yesterday by cutting his throat with a razor.

Mr. Hirsh had been traveling in Europe for his health. He was in a very nervous condition. He returned to New York August 24 with Walter H. Reed, his traveling companion, and stopped at the Knickerbocker, where he was well known.

He intended to return to Chicago yesterday. In the morning he told Mr. Reed that he found that he would have to stay another day. They had adjoining rooms on the seventh floor.

Monday evening Mr. Hirsh was in good spirits and spent some time in Maxine's restaurant. Yesterday morning he went down to breakfast and seemed to be cheerful.

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SKENE TRIAL GOES ON.

Ten Jurors Were Selected Yesterday. Protests Overruled at Albany.

ALBANY, Aug. 30.—The trial of Frederick Skene, former State Engineer and Surveyor, for grand larceny in connection with irregularities in the award of contracts for road improvements during his administration in 1907-08 was continued in the extraordinary term of the Supreme Court here to-day before Justice Coman.

It was apparent that former District Attorney William T. Johnson of New York was prepared to fight every inch of ground as the leading counsel for the accused former State officer.

It was the testimony of Dr. Smith Ely Jelliffe, the alienist, of New York City, that John B. Russell of Long Island City, the contractor jointly indicted with Skene, was suffering from general paresis and locomotor ataxia and probably would never recover.

Mr. Jerome accused Attorney-General O'Malley of unfairness in insisting upon the trial of the first indictment when there were seventeen indictments any one of which might be taken up.

Justice Coman then denied the motion of the defense that the trial of the first indictment be postponed until the trial of the other indictments.
