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A BUSY WEEK FOR WILSON

BIG MEETING IN NEWARK IS PLANNED FOR WEDNESDAY.

Betting There Is Now 10 to 7 on His Victory and Even Money on 25,000 Majority—Bosses Are Ready to Stand by Him, and Talk of 1912 Grows Louder.

PRINCETON, Oct. 30.—The remaining week of Woodrow Wilson's campaign will be spent as follows: Monday, Bayonne and Jersey City; Tuesday, Passaic; Wednesday, Montclair and the Oranges; Thursday, Morristown and Dover; Friday, Perth Amboy, Newark, Newark.

The meetings which promise to be most important as well as most interesting are those in Essex and Morris counties. Of course the Newark meeting in Newark will be a sockdologer. The Morris and Essex meetings should show whether Mr. Wilson will get the commutator vote.

If in those two counties he gets audiences of the same size and with the same enthusiasm as those he had last week in Bergen county it will mean that the Jersey commutator looks his weight.

The election of Mr. Wilson is expected now by all Democrats and many Republicans in the New Jersey.

SHOT TRUER THAN THE GANG.

Witnesses Say Adler Did Not Fire Until Fired On. He Got Two.

The two men shot on Saturday night at the door of a dance hall at 117 West Twenty-third street by Robert Adler, the special policeman on guard, were identified yesterday.

Charles Funk of 55 West Fifty-third street, whom Adler killed with a bullet in the head, was recognized at the morgue by a woman who said that she was his wife.

William Morris of 313 West Forty-fourth street, the wounded man, told his name to the nurses at Bellevue. Adler was sent to the Tombs charged with homicide.

About 11 o'clock on Saturday night the lieutenant on the desk of the new West Twentieth street police station was informed over the telephone that there was going to be trouble right off at the dance hall.

There were a lot of men in the back room of the station house owing to attempted strike troubles and they got around to Twenty-third street when it was all over.

When the police turned over Funk's body they found a revolver under it. Hannan says that in spite of the racket in the hall some of the seventy-five copies in the dance hall were still swinging around to the imperturbable notes of the orchestra.

BORING FOR MOTHER GOLD.

Tunnel 1,400 Feet Into Dome Where Klondike Creeks Originate.

TAHOE, Oct. 30.—In expectation of finding the ledge or auriferous deposit which originally contained all the gold of the Klondike region and in which it is hoped that there remain untold millions, an organization of Dawson miners and business men assisted by the Dominion Government has started to bore a series of tunnels through the dome in which all the gold laden creeks have their source.

The undertaking is a gamble for a stupendous amount of wealth. If the expectations are realized the source from which was mined the Klondike's famous placers of Yukon discovered by George Carmack will be tapped.

From the first local location at Dawson was made it was noted that all the gold-bearing rocks had their source in the great dome or rounded hill. The theory that this hill contained the balance of the treasure not lying in the streams was advanced by many miners and geologists. But nobody had the nerve to tackle the immense undertaking of piercing the hill. Work has now been begun on the dome at Klondike and Stewart rivers. Somewhere in this mountain, geologists believe, lies the native mine.

Whether it lies on a gigantic body or is split up into a series of stringers or whether it lies all over the way by erosion can only be determined by the boring of the tunnel. The tunnel has now been completed for 1,400 feet. It is expected that the Klondikers will see daylight on the other side of the hill within two years. Several small rich veins have been encountered.

AMBULANCE SMASHES AUTO.

Miss Louise Smith in a Collision in Madison Square.

An electric ambulance of the New York Hospital going north in Madison Square last night collided with the automobile of Miss Nina Boardman of 359 Madison avenue. The glass on the front of each car was smashed and the engine of the automobile was wrecked.

There was no patient in the ambulance, Miss Louise H. Smith, the only occupant of the car besides Thomas J. Morris, the chauffeur, suffered slightly from the shock. She took a taxi cab to the Waldorf Astoria, which she had just left.

RESULT OF TARGET PRACTICE.

The Battleship Delaware Leads the Vessels of the Atlantic Fleet.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 30.—The battleship Delaware leads the vessels of the Atlantic fleet in gunnery efficiency. The results of the recent target practice held on the southern drill grounds off Cape Henry, Va., in September were made public today at the Navy Department. The score of the Delaware is noteworthy on account of the fact that she has been in commission for only about eight months.
