WORLD EXTEND DEER SEASON Commissioner Bureau Will Recommend Fifteen Days Later Than Now

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IT WAS CALLIER IN THE TRUNK

POLICE WILL ASK THAT LEWIS BE INDICTED FOR MURDER

Physician Who Treated Callier's Throat Makes Identity of Dead Man Certain Police Get Two of the Frenchman's Paintings Which Lewis Gave Away

Commissioner Flynn announced yesterday that the police are now satisfied that the body found in a trunk in a house on West Fifty-fourth street is that of Albert C. Callier, the French painter. The identification of the remains was made positive by a physician whose name the police are unwilling at present to divulge.

Commissioner Flynn gives the credit of obtaining this positive information to acting Captain Clark and Lieut. McKenny of the West Side division of the detective bureau. They are said to have found the physician who in 1902 treated Callier for throat trouble.

The physician told the detectives that he was positive that the body was Callier's. He had examined the man's throat so frequently, he said, that he was familiar with his teeth, which were taken from Coroner Winterbottom and Prof. Larkin of the College of Physicians and Surgeons and described to them Callier's teeth.

Callier dated May 12, 1902. This is the latest date at which the police have any record that Callier was alive and he believes it is the last letter he ever wrote. In it he complained of feeling sick and said that he was then stopping with Lewis at 140 West Sixty-third street.

A few days later Lewis called on the physician. He said he had seen Callier had gone to Europe and had directed him to call at the doctor's for a couple of paintings by him which the doctor had been looking for. Lewis went away with him. Before Lewis left the doctor says he had to go out to make a call and Lewis went with him in the carriage. After Lewis had left him the doctor discovered that eight or nine dollars was missing from his pocket.

The police have found these paintings and they are now at Headquarters. They are done in oils and framed in gilt. One of them is of lilies of the valley in a bowl.
