A QUEER BIRTH AT ALBANY. The charter of the Carnegie Trust Company was granted by the Legislature in 1898 to a concern known as the Security Assurance Company...

The rights, powers and privileges herein granted to said corporation shall not be controlled, limited or restricted by any existing statute or law of this State...

Except as above provided and except upon subjects or matters relating to which special provisions are made in this act the said corporation shall be subject to all provisions of the laws of this State...

Henry L. Scheuerman, a lawyer at 11 Broadway, who was one of the incorporators, said that he knew nothing of the history of the Security Assurance Company...

The charter of the Security Assurance Company was granted by the Legislature in 1898, when C. C. Dickinson was planning to organize a trust company.

The board of directors, which remained as in the original act, had power under the amendment to increase the number of directors from time to time...

The name of the company was soon changed to "Carnegie Trust Company" and Mr. Dickinson had organized the trust company...

Lawyers said yesterday that the statute permitting the Superintendent of Banks to take control of a trust company when he found it necessary to do so...

CIVIL COURT WON'T AID ROBIN

IF HE'S MAD HE CAN SHOW IT IN CRIMINAL PROCEDURE.

Justice Goff Denies Jerome's Application for an Independent Inquiry Into the Prisoner's State of Mind—Parole Case Going to Grand Jury This Week.

Supreme Court Justice Goff denied yesterday the application of Dr. Louise G. Robinson, by W. T. Jerome as counsel, for the appointment of a committee for the person and property of her brother, Joseph Robin, on her allegation that he is incompetent.

While the motion for the appointment of a committee was not opposed by the District Attorney the court says that "in the exercise of that discretion vested in a Justice of this court by the use of its chancery powers relating to the guardianship of the insane I inspected and took judicial notice of records of the court of criminal jurisdiction of this county and find that Robin, in whose behalf the petition is made, is actually confined under an indictment charging him with a felony."

The court said that under the circumstances if a commission were appointed to inquire into Robin's mental condition such a proceeding might lead not only to confusion but to possible conflict of authority, and thereby tend to impair respect for and confidence in the law and its impartiality.

Justice Goff said further that it cannot be contended that the Legislature intended to discriminate against the poor lunatic and that if it be ordained that a poor lunatic shall not be taken from confinement on a criminal charge and put in a charitable institution the same rule should apply to a lunatic who is not poor and has property out of which he can be maintained through a committee.

The court said that in estimating Robin's property at at least \$50,000 Dr. Robinson was relying upon statements made by others, including Robin's secretary, Mrs. Dorland, and his business associate, Frederick K. Morris.

ALBANY, Jan. 7.—The "Shepard committee" formed for the purpose of securing the election of Edward M. Shepard as United States Senator to-day certified that it had elected Lee Kohls of New York as its first certificate of the kind filed under the amended corrupt practices act which requires the treasurer of a political committee to file a statement of election expenses with the Secretary of State.

ALBANY, Jan. 7.—The State Commission of Highways announced to-day that Gov. Dix has requested that the remaining proposals for highway improvement work, which have been advertised to be received on Jan. 9, 11 and 13, be postponed in order that the plans and specifications may be submitted to and examined by John A. Bense, State Engineer and Surveyor.

Gov. Dix said that the commission had been requested to hold up the opening of the bids merely for purposes of the investigation by the state engineer. There will be no delay in the work because nothing can be done on the roads during the winter and it is not intended to interfere with the letting of the contracts after the plans have been passed upon.
