DETAILS OF A POLICE DOZE

CROSEY FINDS LIEUT. LAKE GUILTY OF SLEEPING.

Lieutenant Lake of harbor precinct A had a hard time in the trial room at Police Headquarters yesterday trying to explain to Commissioner Crosey how he happened to be asleep when First Deputy Commissioner Driscoll and Chief Inspector Schmittberger dropped in at the station house New Year's eve. He was charged not only with having been asleep in the rear room but with having made a false entry in the blotter and with leaving the desk in charge of a policeman.

He was defended by Mirabeau L. Towns, Commissioner Crosey found him guilty and said he would announce his sentence later. Commissioner Driscoll and Inspector Schmittberger testified that they went into the station house a little after 11 o'clock. Policeman James P. Reilly was in the center of the room with a big black dog. The policeman was in his shirt sleeves. He told them that the lieutenant would be in a moment. In a back room they found the lieutenant stretched out on a boat cushion on a table. He had his coat and shoes off and was asleep. When they pushed the door open a piece of wood like a bed slat which had been propped against it from the inside fell with a clatter. Even that did not rouse the lieutenant. When they spoke to him he woke up. He told them that he felt sick.

The Commissioner and the inspector entered in the blotter the state of affairs and when they turned the page found that the 2 o'clock rollcall already was made up. Three men were entered as having returned from Staten Island at 12:06 A. M. and the assignments for the outgoing platoon were complete. It was also stated that the uniforms and equipments of the men had been inspected and found satisfactory. A little more than a page had been left blank for possible happenings during the evening. The last entry before the next morning's rollcall was timed 8:03 P. M.

Lieut. Lake said that he had been on the force for nearly twenty-three years. On the night that he was visited by the Commissioner and the chief inspector he felt sick, he said. He went through the back room, and the cushion on the table looked so inviting he lay down. "I may have dozed, Mr. Commissioner," he said, "but I was not asleep."

"Well, when you know what is going on but are well-dozing?" Lieut. Blake said that he frequently wrote up the blotter ahead of time "to catch up with the work." He could not explain why the pressure of work was so great he allowed only a few minutes that night for the evening's business. In case a policeman's uniform had been in bad shape he said he would have marked his report on uniform inspection "error" and made another report of the condition of the uniform. He added that the uniforms of the harbor squad were not supposed to be in such shape and span over as those of the regular force anyway. He had asked Policeman Reilly, he said, to watch the telephone for him for a few minutes, as he was going to the washroom.

Policeman Reilly was called as a witness and said that he had been without his coat because he had taken it off to inspect the launch and the bell rang before he got back to his coat. He thought that some one might have fallen overboard and he had better answer the bell at once. He evidently thought that when he was called as a witness he had been called on the charge made against him of appearing without his uniform coat, for when his case was called he had disappeared.
