

RACQUET CHAMPIONSHIPS

BOSTON AND NEW YORK WIN IN SEMI-FINAL ROUND

Payne Whitney and M. Barger will meet G. A. Fearing, Jr., and H. D. Scott in two teams in the final round of the racquet championships in the Boston Club courts.

Boston, Jan. 21. It is a case of Boston against New York for the racquet doubles championship of 1911 and the final match looks like a fairly even thing. George R. Fearing, Jr., and H. D. Scott, the Boston pair, are the pair that members of the organization here pin their faith upon to bring the title back to Boston, while Payne Whitney, veteran of many a hard fought match, and M. Barger comprise the team that will endeavor to prevent this coming to pass.

The two teams won their matches in the semi-final round yesterday, Fearing and Scott defeating W. Stackpole and Douglas of New York in four straight games, while Whitney and Barger had to play their best to defeat G. C. Clarke, Jr., and R. Fincke, also of the New York club, six games being necessary to win the match.

A more gruelling contest than that between the two New York teams in the other semi-final has seldom been witnessed on the local courts. Whitney and Barger played up a number of aces at the start of each of the first two games, but their opponents were not bothered in the least by that aspect of affairs. They made uphill flirts, but in each game were unable to overtake the scores of their opponents. In the next two games it was decidedly different. Clarke and Fincke rolled up two aces their second time in hand during the third game and won without difficulty, chiefly because Whitney and Barger began missing with considerable frequency. Neither side was able to score in the fourth game until the service had changed four times. Then Clarke made an ace on his service, breaking the tie. Whitney and Barger took the lead, but fell in play and their opponents rolled up a good lead. The game was finally won by Whitney and Barger with considerable ease because of their superior service and placing.

Fearing's excellent service and some good place shots by Scott won the first game from Stackpole and Douglas. Good service by Fearing when in hand and frequent misses by Clarke and Fincke resulted in victory for the Boston pair in the second game. This was particularly true after the New York team had tied the score at 10-10, and the game rolled up at five. Then Clarke and Fincke gave the local team a lead of 10, and they were never headed. Stackpole and Douglas made a last effort for the fourth game. They kept plugging credulously until they had a lead of 12 to 10, their opponents failing to score three times in succession. Then the locals had a run of four and their opponents out without a ace and finally the score rolled out with the Scott missed and his side out with the score 4-0. Both Stackpole and Douglas failed and their opponents set the game and match on Fearing's service ace.

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Clarke was a whit behind him in endeavoring to make dents in the front wall. There was some great volleying done and the ball was sent whizzing around the court with such speed that it was remarkable that the players were able to follow it not only because of its speed, but because of the darkness. Whitney and Barger were just a trifle better at all stages of the game than their opponents. Barger's service was better than his partner's, but the latter's hard returns and some good placing helped out nicely. Fincke was superior to his partner and this was very noticeable in the third and fourth games when the former got his service going and made some hit returnable place shots. He was more inclined to use the side walls than either of the others and it proved effective. Clarke did not play nearly so well as in the match yesterday.

The first game was won by Whitney and Barger because of their opponents' many misses. In fact the only one made was by Clarke and Fincke had a lead of 5 to 0 in the second game, but missed five times almost in succession and lost an ace on service and one on a place shot by Whitney. In the third game Fincke and Clarke got their game going together and had it very close before their opponents knew it had started. Seven misses being made by the latter. The fourth game was a repetition of the preceding one, with the exception that the service bothered Whitney and Barger more. After a brief rest play was resumed for the fifth game, and here the steadiness of Whitney and Barger proved the undoing of their opponents. After Whitney and Barger had established a good lead in the sixth game their opponents came up strongly and made the score 8-7. Through Whitney and Barger took a brace and ran the game out on place shots and service aces.

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LAHORE'S FINE RACE.

Takes Handicap Event From a Good Field—New Track Record.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Jan. 21.—James Rowe's crack three-year-old Lahore showed a grand performance when he won the Magnolia Handicap at seven furlongs, this afternoon, and horsemen agreed that whoever beats him will take down first money in the rich American Derby. Lahore, who was backed down to favorite, was shut off and knocked back last night after the break came. He ran in that position to the far turn, then began to make up ground gradually, and taking the lead in the last sixteenth beat Jack Parker out in a drive by half a length.

The two-year-olds ran three furlongs today and Tommie Thompson won and equalled the track record for the distance. T. M. Green ran a mile in 1:38 3/5 when he won his race, a new track record, 1:39, held by Orama and Master Robert, being the former figures. Danfield won his first race in the Beverly Stable's colors, but it cost \$65 to retain him, as he was boosted that amount. The books were hard hit on the day's results, as the Saturday crowd made a clean sweep, five favorites winning.
