

BONHAG'S FAST TWO MILES

INDOOR KING WAS FINISHED IN THE GARDEN. Sixty yards ahead of the field, he finished in 2:20 1-3. Elmer Beards, Huston of Yale in sixty yard dash at Irish A. C. Games. Bonhag Wins.

The annual indoor meet of the Irish American A. C. took place last night at Madison Square Garden before a big crowd. The race to interest the crowd mostly was the 200 yard dash, but it was not until the 200 yard dash that the crowd was really interested. The national title champion, however, five mentioned among them being Bonhag and Collins, old rivals at the long distance race. After the 200 yard dash, the crowd was again interested in the 400 yard dash, which was won by Bonhag, but the little fellow tried and the Irish runner drew away. With about half a mile to go Collins passed Malone and started a race for the 1000 yard dash. Effort proved useless, for Bonhag won as he liked by about sixty yards in the good time of 9 minutes 2 1-3 seconds.

The 60 yard handicap was the only sprint of the night, and after three rounds six men qualified for the final. H. Huston of Yale, with a start of six feet, looked like a good thing. He led till within a stride or two from the goal, when J. J. Elmer of the Irish American A. C. came in from behind and nipped him. Elmer had an allowance of one foot, and the time was 2:25 2-3 seconds.

An interesting race of one mile mile between New York, Boston and Brooklyn proved highly exciting. After three rounds Foster for Boston took the lead and was quickly overhauled by Dorland for Brooklyn. 
