PHILHARMONIC AND SYMPHONY CONCERTS.

MacDowell Concerts Played by Ernest Hutchinson. A new symphony in Paul Frank's "Symphonic Variations." The popularity of the Sunday afternoon concert of the Philharmonic Society was attested again yesterday by the presence of a large audience in Carnegie Hall. The entertainment began with a spirited performance of Liszt's "Le Roi des Vagues" in which Leo Schatz, first violin of the orchestra, especially distinguished himself by his playing of the isolated and melodious little solo on his instrument.

The canal was projected primarily as a military precaution and necessity."

RABBI MAGNES'S NEW POST.

He Will Head a Congregation Which Supports His Reforms. The Rev. Judah Leon Magnes, who used to be associate rabbi at the Temple Emanu-El, at Fifth avenue and Forty-third street, has accepted the offer of the rabbinate of the Congregation Bnai B'rurim. Magnes notified the trustees of Temple Emanu-El last May that he would decline reelection in case the congregation could not uphold him in his reform program. He was told that his conditions were impossible and that the trustees regretted the necessary separation. Dr. Magnes has advocated the reinstitution of the study of the Hebrew language among young and old Jews and the abandonment of the union prayer book used at present in Reform Hebrew congregations.
