START OF THE HOE SALE.

The First Day's Offerings Bring a Total of More Than \$100,000.

The sale of the late Robert Hoe's art collection was begun at the American Art Galleries yesterday afternoon, with Thomas E. Kirby as auctioneer. The 215 catalogue lots, which represented a much larger number of objects, were sold for \$107,500.

The evening sales began at Mendelssohn Hall, in which the first instalment of the paintings which Mr. Hoe collected for a new arbitration plan.
